Anson High School offers a wide range of activities intended to simultaneously provide students with skills demanded in the labor market, while preparing them for post-secondary degrees in technical fields. Activities include not only specific career-oriented classes, but also internships, apprenticeships and in-school programs designed to foster work readiness.

For non-college-bound students, our classes can provide hands-on training that translates directly to attractive careers upon graduation. Work-related or internship-like experiences that are often a part of our Career and Technical Education classes can teach students the "soft skills" necessary in the labor market.

Finally, by integrating academic skills into a "real world" context, advocates claim that these classes can motivate students to attend school more frequently and be more engaged, and therefore improve core academic skills.



Adobe Digital Design and Video Design are projectbased courses in which students use Adobe programs to plan, design, build and maintain effective communications and are able to achieve professional certifications in each.





Automotive classes cover learning the basic automotive skills to building advanced skills such as vehicle servicing, testing, repair and diagnosis of systems while emphasizing hands-on experience. Class topics align to the Maintenance and Light Repair (MLR) requirements, as part of the NATEF accreditation. Students in this pathway are able to master the skills necessary to pursue a career in this field.
