Extension Notes Smart Uses for Your Tax Refund a plan. Make a commitment to enjoy part of the money. Be smart, and use the rest for practical purposes. Allocate 80 percent of your refund for "smart uses" and the remaining 20 percent as cash for enjoyment or to make a special purchase.

Smart money tips from the NC Cooperative Extension publication "Smart Uses for Your Tax Refund" are handy to remember. Consider the following smart uses to improve your finances and make the coming year more enjoyable.

Pay down debt. Paying down credit card debt will save you money on high interest rate debt. Credit card debt can be hard to pay off when making only the minimum payment because most of the payment goes to interest. If you carry over a balance every month, only a few dollars of each minimum payment goes toward reducing the principal owed. Paying down debt is like earning interest. For example, if your credit card charges 18 percent interest on purchases, paying down that debt is like earning 18 percent on your money.

• Save for special events. Set aside some money for holiday and birthday gifts. Make an additional deposit into a savings account or open a new one especially for this purpose. Then make regular additional deposits over the coming months. If you changed your income tax withholding and are receiving additional money in your paycheck, consider putting 10 to 15 percent of the recaptured pay into this account. Then congratulations! You are on your way to stress-free holidays and birthdays. • Open an emergency savings account to provide easy access to funds for unexpected expenses. When the tire goes flat, the car battery needs replacing, or the washing machine breaks, money in an emergency account will let you pay for these expenses without going into debt. An emergency savings account can help you stay out of debt or keep credit balances from growing while you pay off the credit account. Recognize the value of being able to pay for unplanned expenses in cash or mostly cash. Make a commitment to keep adding to the account. The Byrds Founder Roger McGuinn Performs at Wingate University

One of the musical innovators of the twelve-string guitar, Roger McGuinn, will perform his favorite folk songs on Thursday, March 22 at 7:30 p.m. at The Batte Center at Wingate University. McGuinn, co-founder and former front man for the folk-rock band The Byrds, became famous for his hit renditions of Bob Dylan's Tambourine Man and Peter Seeger's Turn! Turn! Turn!

Jim McGuinn, later known as Roger, was already a veteran of the music scene when he co-founded the group that would become the Byrds with Gene Clark and David Crosby in 1964. McGuinn's trademark 12-string Rickenbacker guitar "jingle, jangle" sound defined the new folk-rock sound. Columbia Records signed the Byrds a year later and the band recorded their first number one hit Mr. Tambourine Man.

McGuinn later decided to go solo and his solo career has generated 10 albums, one Grammy nomination and a lively touring schedule. His CD "Treasures from the Folk Den" included duets with Pete Seeger, Joan Baez,

Judy Collins, Odetta, Jean Ritchie, Josh White Jr. and Frank and Mary Hamilton. The CD was nominated for a Grammy in 2002 in the category of "Best Traditional Folk Album."


Opened in 1999, the George A. Batte, Jr. Fine Arts Center presents events in the McGee
