Anson County Unemployment Rate 12.8% in January

Anson County's unemployment rate for January was 12.8%, a whole percentage point nigher than December's 11.8% rate. The state unemployment rate was 10.2%, higher than

In January 2011 Anson County's unemployment rate was 11.6%.

Anson's total labor force in January was 11,128. Of that number 9,709 were employed and 1,419 were unemployed. In December the total labor force was 11,238, with 9,907employed and 1.331 unemployed.

Unemployment rates increased in all of North Carolina's 100 counties in January. All 14 of the state's metro areas also experienced rate increases. The January statewide not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 10.2 percent.

Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 20.4 percent while Orange County had the lowest at 6.6 percent. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 14.1 percent experienced the highest rate and Durham-Chapel Hill at 7.7 percent had the lowest.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates dropped in 30 counties, increased in 63 and remained unchanged in seven. Four metro areas experienced decreases, while eight experienced increases and two remained the same.

Statewide the number of workers employed (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in January by 30,998 to 4,255,318, while those unemployed rose 37,412 to 482,822. Since January 2012, the number of workers unemployed increased 14,640, while those employed increased 68,375.
