Make sure your steam dial gauge is correct. The Anson Cooperative Extension Center is offering Pressure Canner Dial Gauge testing for steam dial gauge lids only. Weighted gauges do not require testing.

The Extension Center will offer free testing beginning on Monday, May $16\ \text{for two}$ weeks through Friday, May 27. Simply bring your canner lid, or just the gauge, to the Extension Center at 501 McLaurin Street and drop it off. Gauges will be checked, and you will receive a call when it is ready to be picked up. Office hours are $8:30\ a.m.$ to $12:00\ noon$ and 1:00 until 5:00 p.m. Canning publications and information are also available


