Anson County's March Unemployment Rate Dropped to 4.8%

Anson County's unemployment rate for March was 4.8%, lower than February's 5.2% rate. Statewide the unemployment rate was 4.3% in March.

Anson's total labor force in March was 10,677. Of that number 10,162 were employed and 515 were unemployed. In February the total labor force was 10,520 with 9,975 employed and 545 unemployed. March was the first time Anson County has had over 10,000 people employed since October 2017.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased

all 100 of North Carolina's counties in March. Hyde County had the highest unemployment rate at 12.7%, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.3 %. All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 6.3 percent had the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.5 percent. When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 76 counties, increased in 17, and remained unchanged in seven. 13 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year and two remained unchanged.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in March by 29,951 to 4,780,438, while those unemployed decreased 11,315 to 215,431. Since March 2017, the number of workers employed statewide increased 68,826, while those unemployed decreased 6,419.

Water Line Break Shuts Down **Highway 74 West in Anson County**

A 12-inch water line ruptured along the shoulder of Highway 74 West near Old Prison Camp Road, east of Polkton, shutting down both westbound lanes for much of the day on Thursday, May 17. A detour was put in place for motorists along Boggan Cut Road, Highway 742 North and Ansonville-Polkton Road.

The closure allowed crews can repair the damaged water line and replace the pavement that was torn out for the repair.

DOT Grants Approved for Fencing at Anson Airport

The N.C. Board of Transportation has approved state and federal funds for much-needed improvements to 19 North Carolina airports. Anson County received \$37,000 for new perimeter fencing around the terminal area. The \$10.2 million in funding will be used to provide

improvements such as better lighting, longer runways and repairs to hangars and terminal buildings.

North Carolina airports serve as a vital economic engine connecting people and business enterprises with the world. For example, the funds will improve safety and customer service at the Edenton airport, says Harry Davis, manager of Edenton's Northeastern Regional Airport.

"Right now, we're having to use a fuel truck to fill up these aircraft," Davis said. "Once we get this new pavement in, aircraft will be able to pull right up to the

fueling area. This is much safer and more convenient for the pilots that come through here.' Airports and aviation-related industries contribute \$31 billion to North Carolina's economy each year,

according to a 2016 report. There are 123,400 airportrelated jobs in the state. The Division of Aviation is responsible for state airport and aviation system planning and development, and provides funding to communities for constructing and improving airports throughout the state.

The funds awarded do not in all cases represent the total cost of the project.

'On the Road, On the Water, Don't Drink and Drive' Campaign This Weendend

The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, State Highway Patrol and Mothers Against Drunk Driving will kick off the eighth annual "On the Road, On the Water, Don't Drink and Drive" campaign this Memorial Day weekend, May 25-27. The multi-agency safety initiative works to reduce alcohol-related accidents on the state's roadways and waterways, both of which see increased traffic during summer months. "It's easy to prevent alcohol-related accidents on the road

and the water," said Maj. Chris Huebner of the Wildlife Resources Commission. "If your holidays include drinking alcohol, make sure to designate a driver whether you're in a car or on a vessel.' Starting Memorial Day weekend, enforcement officers

will be conducting sobriety checkpoints and promoting public awareness to deter impaired operation of vehicles and vessels. Awareness and enforcement efforts are centered on four of the busiest summer weekends, including:

June 29–July 1 (Operation Dry Water) • July 6–8 • September 1–3 In North Carolina a driver or vessel operator with

a blood-alcohol concentration that meets or exceeds .08, or is substantially impaired by alcohol and/or drugs, is subject to arrest.

The campaign is coordinated by the Wildlife Resources Commission and the State Highway Patrol, and supported

Anson Businesses Presented with Safety Awards

NC Department of Labor recognizes Anson County businesses

The N.C. Department of Labor honored area employers and employees at the agency's annual safety awards banquet in Wadesboro on Monday, May 21.

"It's really an honor for me to travel throughout the state and recognize these employers who are making a commitment to their employees' safety and health," Commissioner Berry said. "Over the past 17 years, North Carolina has experienced a declining injury and illness rate, which now rests at an all-time low 2.5 per 100 full-time workers for private industry. These employers continue to make North Carolina workplaces some of the safest in the country.'

The awards honor outstanding on-the-job safety achievements of each recipient during 2017. Recipients are located in Charlotte, Cleveland, Cordova, Greensboro, Hamlet, Lilesville, Peachland, Polkton, Rockingham, Troy and Wadesboro.

Commissioner Berry was the keynote speaker at the banquet and presented the awards. The event, co-sponsored by the Anson County Chamber of Commerce, was held at Oliver's Restaurant in uptown Wadesboro.

Under program rules, companies must have been free of fatal accidents at the site for which the award is given to be eligible. The gold award criteria are based on a DART rate that is at least 50 percent below the statewide rate for its industry. The rate includes cases of days away from work, restricted activity or job transfer. The silver award is based only on cases with days away from work. They are recorded when the worker misses at least one full day of work, not including the day of the injury. The applicant must attain an incidence rate for cases with days away from work that is at least 50 percent below More information on the Labor Department's Safety Awards Program is available by
