Some time ago I shared some of the memories of the National Hotel Coffee Shop. There were so many stories, I thought you might enjoy another one or two!

Many of the young girls got their first job at the Coffee Shop. Some of them were Elaine Luther, Dot Lett and Loretta Driggers...and many more who worked there and remember.

The picture above is of the interior of the Coffee Shop. Seated in the booth are P. D. Stephenson and his wife Lucy, and W. B. (Bill) Terrell and his wife Evelyn.

The Stephensons came to Wadesboro in 1931, where he served as manager of the Roses 5&10 Store across the street from the hotel. He and Mrs. Stephenson were newlyweds!

Bill Terrell was principal and teacher at Wadesboro High

School from 1943-45, and was also coach of the girls basketball team. In 1945-48 he was Superintendent of WHS, leaving in 1948 to be school Superintendent for Warren County Schools.

While Bill was in Wadesboro Ruth Waddell (Hickman) was his secretary, and at times visited with the Terrells and the Stephensons.

You will note all the pictures on the Coffee Shop walls - that was a "trademark" of Vic Davis - he loved publicity!

Johnny Livingston remembers, as a young man fresh out of McFarlan, staying at the hotel while working "in town." Many traveling salesmen, and many local folks - Bruce Wall, Burgess Medley, Deacon Rivers - stayed at the hotel while Vic and Mattie Davis were there.

SPCC Releases President's List, Dean's List for Spring 2012 Semester

Free Kids Fishing Events to be Held the Next Two Weekends

Now is a great time to take a kid fishing, as more than 35 free, family-oriented fishing events are scheduled across the state in celebration of National Fishing and Boating Week 2012. Supported by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, in cooperation with Neuse Sport Shop, N.C. State Council of Trout Unlimited, Bass Pro Shops and the U.S. Forest Service, these fishing events provide opportunities for young anglers to learn fishing basics, such as casting, knot-tying and tackle selection. They also let young anglers try their luck at reeling in a variety of freshwater fish — many of them stocked by the Commission — including trout in the mountains and channel catfish in the Piedmont and Coastal regions.

Participants registered at any listed event will be entered into a statewide, random drawing to win 152 fishing-related prizes. The grand prize is a lifetime sportsman license, which includes fishing privileges in freshwater and saltwater, as well as hunting privileges, donated by Neuse Sport Shop in Kinston. The first prize is a lifetime freshwater fishing license, donated by the N.C. State Council of Trout Unlimited.

Bass Pro Shops is donating 50 fishing-related prizes, such as tackle boxes, rod-and-reel combos and fishing line, while the Wildlife Commission is donating another 100 prizes — any of which would be a perfect addition to a young angler's tackle box. Local sponsors for many events will provide prizes and gifts to registered participants as well.

The Commission will conduct the drawing for the prizes in late June. The names of winners, as well as their prizes, will be posted on the Commission's website, www.ncwildlife.org.

Veterans May Receive Reimbursement for NCDOI Licensing Exams

Insurance Commissioner Wayne Goodwin is proud to announce that eligible veterans may now seek reimbursement for the cost of license examinations administered by the North Carolina Department of Insurance. The Department of Insurance sought and received approval from the United States Department of Veteran Affairs to participate in the federal reimbursement program. VA reimburses veterans for approved licensing or certification tests under special provisions of the GI-Bill.

"I am pleased that the Department of Insurance is helping support our veteran applicants as they advance their careers in insurance-related fields," said Goodwin. "I strongly encourage veterans to apply for reimbursement when taking licensing exams offered by our department."

Eligible examinations, administered by Pearson Vue on behalf of Department of Insurance, include license examinations for insurance producers and agents, insurance adjusters and bail bondsmen.

Upon completion of an eligible state examination, veterans may apply for reimbursement through the Veteran Affairs website. Veterans may also be reimbursed for retaking a state examination that he or she did not initially pass.

Wildlife in NC Magazine Begins Annual Photo Competition

The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission will hold the eighth annual Wildlife in North Carolina photo competition, with entries accepted from June 1 until Sept. 1, 2012. This year, rules require entrants to be either a current magazine subscriber or younger than 18.

"Last year, nearly 1,000 photographers entered more than 4,000 outdoor images," said Jim Wilson, editor of Wildlife in North Carolina. "To have the budget to hold such a large-scale photo competition necessitated implementing the new entry policy. Considering a one-year subscription is only \$12, entering the competition is still quite reasonable."

Photos will be judged in 10 categories: 1) Birds; 2) Mammals; 3) Reptiles and Amphibians; 4) Invertebrates; 5) Wild Landscapes; 6) Youth Photographer, 12 and younger; 7) Youth Photographer, 13-17; 8) Wild Plants; 9) Outdoor Recreation; and 10) Animal Behavior.

Entries will be judged by a panel composed of staff from the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission, Museum of Natural Sciences and N.C. Division of Parks and Recreation. All winners will be published in the January/February 2013 issue, with the grand prize image appearing on the cover. Winning photographs will be exhibited at the N.C. Museum of Natural Sciences in Raleigh and at other science museums and wildlife education centers across the state.

The grand prize winner also receives \$200. Other prizes include: First place, all categories, \$100; Second place, all categories, \$75; and Third place, all categories, \$50.

JW Photo Labs of Raleigh is sponsoring the statewide exhibits of winning photographs. Competition partners are UNC-TV and the N.C. Division of Parks and Recreation. Corporate co-sponsor is the Great Outdoor Provision Co.
