



#### **Preparing for Flu Season**

Cooler weather is quickly approaching and that means it's time for scarfs, mittens and flu vaccines. Already health experts say it's time to start preparing for flu season and taking preventative actions.

'Flu season can begin as early as October and as last as late as May," said Sandra Teal, nurse practitioner at Carolinas HealthCare System Anson.

The flu, or influenza, is a serious disease caused by a virus that infects the respiratory system. Though colds are also caused by viruses, the symptoms of the two illnesses have some differences. Flu symptoms are more severe and affect the whole body and are more likely to be accompanied by fever, chills, nausea, headache and extreme exhaustion.

Every flu season is different and it affects people in different ways. Even healthy people can get the flu and spread it to others.

"The flu is awfully unpleasant so getting the flu vaccine is a good idea for anyone who wants to reduce their risk of getting sick," said Sandra. "The sooner you get the vaccine the better because it takes time after getting the vaccine for antibodies to develop in your body and for your immune system to provide protection against the flu."

In addition to getting your flu vaccine, there are several other preventive actions you can do to avoid catching or spreading the flu, including:

 Maintaining a healthy diet, exercising, drinking plenty of fluids and getting plenty of sleep can help keep your immune system strong.

• Avoid close contact with people who are ill.

· Wash your hands often to avoid spreading germs. Regular hand washing is one of

the best ways to protect yourself from seasonal illnesses. Use antibacterial disinfectant to regularly clean surfaces that may spread the infection.

• Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze.

• Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
