Anson County Covid-19 Update -Big Increase in Active Cases

The latest information posted by the Anson County Health Department on Tuesday, January 4 showed 4,464 total Covid-19 cases, with 322 active. There were 237 active cases reported just one day earlier, on January 3. The total deaths are 88. Just a week ago, on December 28 there were 4,234 total Covid-19 cases, with 123 active and 87. One day after that, on December 29 there were 155 cases, and on December 30 there were 179 cases.

Vaccines are available for everyone 5 years old and older, including walk-in clinics. (Children 5-11 by appointment only.) Vaccine boosters are available. They are free, and all you have to do is call the Health Department at 704-694-5188 for more information. Walk-in clinics are on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 8:30 to 11:00 a.m. and

Covid Testing Free testing is available Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. without an appointment. Testing takes place in the old hospital parking lot at 500 Morven Road in Wadesboro. No appointment is needed and there is no charge for the Covid test. Results will be called or emailed directly to the person tested or, in the case of children, to their parent or adult caregiver, in 2-3 days. They will test anyone over the age of $1.\,$

The NC Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) reported that statewide as of Tuesday, January 4 there were 10,276 newly reported cases (up from 4,889new cases on December 27). There were 19,494 deaths, with 3,008 hospitalized. Vaccination rates are only creeping up, with 74% of adults in NC having one dose and 69% with two doses

Taking Stock of 2021 and **Looking Forward to 2022**

 Product Development: When Big Toys Direct acquired the former Walmart building in July, we celebrated a major win for the community, but we also lost our last marketable industrial building of more than 25,000 square feet. In fact, the day that deal closed, our active projects list decreased by nearly half because those projects were also considering that building. In today's world, a community without a viable industrial building for sale is going to have a tough time attracting jobs and investment. That's why the state funding for water/sewer improvements at Atlantic Gateway and the construction of speculative industrial buildings was so crucial to our future. While the cupboard is going to be a little bare for most of 2022, the infrastructure and spec building projects will put Anson County near the top of the list for new projects going forward.

 Entrepreneurship: Our ongoing efforts, in cooperation with the Chamber and Uptown Wadesboro, Inc., to create a fertile environment for business startups began to show results in 2021, as a bevy of new entrepreneurial ventures opened in and around Uptown; Studio 356, Bank Shots, A&J Winery, The Kestless Writer, a new clothing store and Sable Toney Law. REV Uptown has been at the center of many of these ventures, and we are excited about how it has brought the community together and served as a launchpad for creative services in the county, and our Bootstrap and Enterprise grant programs have provided the financial boost necessary to bring ideas to life.

 Representation and Commitment: AnsonEDP and our "parent" organization, Anson Economic Development Corporation, added some excellent new Board members in 2021, enhancing an already outstanding leadership team and extending our impact throughout the county. Our Board and staff collaborated to create a new strategic plan that will guide the organization through the next five years. Interested in what's included in that plan? I am fortunate to be here in Anson County and to work with a great Board and my colleagues at the Chamber of Commerce, Uptown Wadesboro, Inc., and the Tourism Development Authority. I hope to see them more face-toface in the coming year and to see COVID fade as an issue in economic development.

Annual Toll Rate Increase for Triangle Expressway and Monroe Expressway January 1

The annual increase of the toll rates for the Triangle

Expressway and the Monroe Expressway, took effect on Saturday, January 1, 2022. The North Carolina Turnpike Authority Board adopted schedules of incremental annual toll rate increases for both the Triangle Expressway and Monroe Expressway based on the financing requirements For NC Quick Pass customers with a transponder

traveling the full length of the Triangle Expressway the cost will increase 11 cents to \$3.71, or approximately three percent. For customers with a transponder traveling the full length of the Monroe Expressway, the cost will increase 6 cents to \$2.72, or approximately two percent.

Toll revenue is used to pay off bonds sold to fund the construction of the projects, as well as fund the overall road maintenance including repairs, mowing and winter weather preparation and response.

Drivers can get a free NC Quick Pass transponder that can be used on all toll facilities in North Carolina and saves travelers 35% compared to the bill-by-mail rate. Information is available at www.ncquickpass.com or call 877-769-7277.

Anson County's Unemployment Rate 4.7% in November

Anson County Anson County's unemployment rate for November was 4.7%, down from October's 5.2% rate. Here are other 2021 rates: September 4.9%; August 5.8%; July 5.9%; June 6.1%; May 5.5%; April 5.4%; March 5.9%; February 7.5%; January 7.7%. The 2020 rates were: December 7.1%; November 7.2%; October 7.2%; September 8.5%; August 8%; July 10%; June 7.9%; May 10.1%; and April 8.2%. In March 2020 the unemployment rate in Anson County was 4.9%, just before the pandemic. **Statewide** Statewide the unemployment rate for November was 3.4%. In October 3.6%

Here are other 2021 rates: September 3.8%; August 4.4%; July 4.6%; June 4.9%; May 4.5%; April 4.4%; March 4.6%; February 5.6%; January and December 2020 6%. Other 2020 rates: November and October 6.1%; September 7%; August 6.8%; July 8.9%.

Anson's total labor force in November was 10,513. Of that number 10,024 were employed and 489 were unemployed. In October the total labor force was 10,554, with 10,002 employed and 552 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 97 of North Carolina's counties in November and increased in three. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 7.0 percent while Orange County had the lowest at 2.4 percent.

All fifteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount had the highest rate at 5.2 percent while Durham-Chapel Hill had the lowest at 2.7 percent. The November not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 3.4%

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in November by 12,364 to 4,896,622, while those unemployed decreased by 15,601 to 170,606. Since November 2020, the number of workers employed statewide increased

173,360, while those unemployed decreased 144,592
