Joe was born in Wadesboro on October 23, 1956, to Gene and Myrtle Johnson Dutton. He was the brother that his sisters prayed for, and he was THE best brother ever. He was the apple of his daddy's eye and Joe followed him around as much as he could, learning things such as how to trade guns, ride and trade horses, hunt, chase drunk drivers, chauffeur the Lt. Joe was a 1975 graduate of Bowman High School. While at Bowman he loved being in the marching band and jazz ensemble, playing his trumpet. His passion for music most likely originated from this. He was a quick study when Rick Matthews, his brother-in-law, later taught him to play the guitar.

Moore and Sons, in their home office in Wadesboro, as credit manager for the Moore's chain. Most recently he has been employed by Anson County Government in the tax office as the county Tax Collector.

In 1996 Joe started his hand at his own auction company, Circle 8 Auction. He would sell a few things here and there, then began working estate auctions. He enjoyed this the most because of the people he would get to see, old friends, and making new friends.
