



### Application Period Now Open For State Government Summer STEM Program

#### High school girls interested in STEM-related public service careers can apply through February 23

The application period for the annual Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program is now open. North Carolina high school girls in grades 9 through 12 may apply now through February 23, 2026, for the four-week paid summer STEM enrichment opportunity with North Carolina state government. Established in 2019 by the North Carolina Department of Administration's Division for Women and Youth, the Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program provides college-bound students with the opportunity to explore STEM-based careers within state government while encouraging more young women to enter these fields.

According to a report published by the National Girls Collaborative Project, women make up 48 percent of the national workforce but accounted for only 35 percent of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics jobs in 2025. The Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program aims to nurture interest among high school girls in STEM-related public service careers and help address this gap.

"STEM careers continue to be on the rise and in high demand, proving to be among the top-tier professions of today and tomorrow," said North Carolina Department of Administration Secretary Gabriel J. Esparza. "We need to get more of our best and brightest students interested in STEM careers, including by encouraging more girls to pursue careers in this growing field."

Candidate interviews will take place in mid to late March, with selected applicants notified of their placement in April. The mentorship program will run weekdays from July 6 through July 31.

All mentees are expected to work 40 hours per week, with time divided between working side-by-side with women leaders for 24 hours each week and participating in a group project for 16 hours weekly. The summer enrichment experience also includes lunch-and-learn sessions and field trips to various state government agencies. Students who complete the program will receive a \$1,700 stipend.

Participating agencies this year include the North Carolina departments of Administration, Commerce, Environmental Quality, Natural and Cultural Resources, Public Safety, Revenue, and Transportation, along with the Office of State Budget and Management and the Office of State Human Resources.

In addition to working on a technology project, last year's Lady Cardinal mentees took part in a geology tour with the Department of Environmental Quality, visited the Biogen campus at Research Triangle Park, and participated in lunch-and-learn sessions with state government leaders, among other educational activities.

The purpose and goals of the Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program are based on recommendations from the 2018 Status of Women in North Carolina Employment and Earnings Report, released by the Division for Women and Youth in collaboration with the Institute for Women's Policy Research. The report highlights disparities in employment and earnings between women and men across the state. ### Anson Department of Social Services Opens Heating Assistance Applications for Eligible Households

#### Applications for Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) now being accepted

The Anson County Department of Social Services (DSS) invites qualifying residents to apply for the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) to help with heating costs this winter. Due to the federal government shutdown, there was a delay in accepting applications, but the program is now fully underway.

Automated LIEAP payments were distributed at the end of November for households with a person who met one or more of the following criteria:

- 60 years of age or older,
- A person with a disability receiving services through the NCDHHS Division of Aging,
- Currently receives Food and Nutrition Services (SNAP),
- Or received a LIEAP payment during the 2024-2025 season.

Households that meet these criteria but did not receive the automated payment may apply online starting December 10, 2025, at [epass.nc.gov](http://epass.nc.gov). Additionally, residents can contact Anson DSS for assistance with applications by phone, in person, or by printing a paper application from [epass.nc.gov](http://epass.nc.gov) to mail, fax, or drop off at the agency.

For all other eligible households, applications opened on January 2, 2026. Applications will be accepted until March 31, 2026, or until funds are exhausted.

To be eligible for LIEAP, a household must meet the following criteria:

- At least one U.S. citizen or qualifying non-citizen in the household,
- Income at or below 130% of the federal poverty level,
- Responsible for heating costs.
