Anson County's November Unemployment Rate Still Low at 5.1%

Anson County's unemployment rate for November remained low at 5.1%, thought it was up from October's 4.7% rate. Statewide the unemployment rate was 4.5% in November.

Anson's total labor force in November was 10,486. Of that number 9,946 were employed and 540 were unemployed. In October the total labor force was 10,578 with 10,076 employed and 502 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 99 of North Carolina's counties in November and decreased in one. Tyrrell County had the highest unemployment rate at 8.1 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.4 percent.

All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 6.5 percent had the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.6 percent. The November not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.5 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 99 counties and remained unchanged in one. All 15 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in November by 29,500 to 4,722,457, while those unemployed increased 18,290 to 222,035. Since November 2016, the number of workers employed statewide increased 42,896, while those unemployed decreased 19,410.

Local Initiative has Begun to Mentor Area Students Who Have an Interest in a Medical Career

The Elizabeth Program helps students throughout their medical schooling, with aim that they return to the area as doctors

A new program has started in Anson County to help future physicians stay on track to eturn to practice here. Expected improvements include better access to health care for ocal residents, lowered costs and improved health status.

Sponsored by the local Rotary Club, these individuals, Caroline Goins, Dave Anderson, Beth Diggs, Maggie Gibson, Alex Harrington, Bonnie Morgan, Alex Sewell and Stephanie Wilson, have signed on to become volunteer mentors in the Flizabeth Program: Mentoring for Medicine. The program works with students from the area to provide mentoring and resources to achieve success in preparing for and making a career in medicine here. Students can start as early as high school or college, and are mentored through medical school, residency and their return to the area. The Elizabeth Program was founded by Rev. Marty McCarthy and is supported by E. Larry Newton, Ph.D., a psychologist. The program trains volunteer mentors to connect with students who show the potential

to be successful in medical school. It matches mentors and students, and provides support and guidance to mentors. The local effort began with a presentation on the Elizabeth Program Mentoring for Medicine Initiate to the local Rotary Club on April 13, 2017. Mentoring is a nationally recognized significant resource for improving lives. The

month of January has been proclaimed by presidents in recent years as National Mentoring Month. Mentored young people are less likely to drink and more likely to achieve good grades and social effectiveness than young people without a mentor. They are more likely to thrive and to succeed. The local team had its first training session on December 6. The team will begin to

reach out to schools in the upcoming weeks to identify and invite students to participate The team's mentoring efforts will be ongoing. Mentoring will take place in local restaurants, over the phone, by email and by text. There is a shortage of primary care physicians in rural North Carolina. Here is the

mpact: Rural areas like ours have 30% more preventable hospitalizations and a mortality rate that is 18% higher than same-age people living in urban areas, according to a report from the NC Rural Health Research Program. Fewer local primary care doctors results in too few prevention appointments, and appointments often so far away as to be either stressful or in many cases missed. A trusting and useful relationship with a physician fails to develop; vital information exchange often fails as a result. These negative effects hurt the the quality of life for our citizens and dim the hopes for the future. Experience in other parts of the country, in the far northwest, as well as New Mexico

and Alabama for example, demonstrate that supporting students to maintain ties to their rural roots and values greatly improves the likelihood that they will return home to practice. Because college and medical school students are generally away from local resources

and relationships, mentoring will most often take place by phone, mail, email and other means. When students are in town, face to face meetings are encouraged. A mentor elationship built on sincerity and consistently dedicated to bringing the best out of students makes this work. So here is what is in this for you.
