Anson County's November Unemployment Rate Information

Anson County Anson County's unemployment rate for November was 4.1%. The October rate was 4.0%. Anson County ranked #78 of the 100 counties statewide (low to high).

Here are other past rates in Anson County: **2023**: September 3.8%; August 4.2%; July 4.2%; June 4.2%; May 4.0%; April 3.6%; March 3.9%; February 4%; January 4.3%. **2022**: December 4.0%; November 4.6%; October 4.9%; September 4.2%; August 4.9%; July 4.7%; June 5.3%; May 4.7%; April 4.6%; March 4.9%; February 5.1%; January 5.1%. **2021**: December 4.4%; November 4.7%; October 5.2%; September 4.9%; August 5.8%; July 6.5%; June 6.1%; May 5.5%; April 5.4%; March 5.9%; February 7.5%; January 7.7%. The **2020** rates were: December 7.1%; November 7.2%; October 7.2%; September 8.5%; August 8%; July 10%; June 7.9%; May 10.1%; and April 8.2%.

In March 2020 the unemployment rate in Anson County was 4.9 percent, just before it was affected by the pandemic.

Statewide Statewide the unemployment rate for November was 3.4%. In October it was 3.3%.

Anson's total labor force in November was 10,160, with 9,748 employed and 412 unemployed. In October the total labor foce was 10,203, with 9,794 employed and 409 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 39 of North Carolina's counties in November 2023, decreased in 17, and remained unchanged in 44. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 5.9 percent while Buncombe and Swain Counties each had the lowest at 2.6 percent.

Five of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases, two decreased, and eight remained unchanged. Among the metro areas, Fayetteville and Rocky Mount each had the highest rate at 4.6 percent while Asheville had the lowest at 2.8 percent. The not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 3.4 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 89 counties, increased in five, and remained unchanged in six. All fifteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in November by 27,699 to 5,086,500, while those unemployed increased by 402 to 177,244. Since November 2022, the number of workers employed statewide increased 126,461, while those unemployed decreased 7,217.

It is important to note that employment estimates are subject to large seasonal patterns; therefore, it is advisable to focus on over-the-year changes in the not seasonally adjusted estimates.

We were blown away by the generous donation from the campaign Jon G's organized when their owners (Kelly and Jon) had a vision again this year to raise money for groceries/food for needy children and their families in our schools. They had an overwhelming response to their campaign. and on December 15 Kelly and Jon gave First Presbyterian Church a donation of over \$3,000 to go toward the purchase of groceries for each family.

First Presbyterian Church had previously set aside \$500 plus donations from church members. With both Jon G's donation and the

church's contribution, around 20 buggies ful of groceries were purchased to serve needy families.
