According to the latest information posted by the Anson County Health Department on Friday, January 13 the county was at 8,225 total reported Covid-19 cases, with 78 active and 101 deaths. On January 6 the county was at 8,200 total cases, with 103 active. On December 14 the county was at 8009 total cases, with 37 active and 100 deaths. On November 17 the county was at 7,940 total cases, with 25 active and 100 deaths.

The Health Department stated that Covid cases have increased since the holidays. If you have not received your updated booster, please come and see them.

## **Application Period Now Open for Summer STEM Program in State Government**

#### High school girls interested in STEM-related public service careers can apply

Know a high school girl interested in public service and a future career in science, technology, engineering, and/or mathematics? The NC Department of Administration (DOA) is accepting applications for the summer Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program. This four-week, paid annual mentorship program with state government leaders is open to North Carolina high school girls, grades 9-12. Established in 2019 by DOA's Council for Women and Youth Involvement, the Lady

Cardinal Mentorship Program seeks to improve gender inequity by providing college bound girls an opportunity to explore STEM-based careers within North Carolina state government.

This program is designed to nurture the interest of our young women in public service while preparing them for careers that are often male dominated," said DOA Secretary Pamela B. Cashwell. "We aim to change the current trajectory of STEM careers, building a better future for women, families and for the state of North Carolina.

Interested students can apply for the Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program now through Feb. 24. Program and application information can be found on the DOA website (ncadmin.nc.gov/divisions/council-women-youth/lady-cardinal-mentorship-program). Candidate interviews will occur in mid-March and selected applicants will be notified of placement in April. The mentorship program will run weekdays July 10 through August 4. All mentees are expected to work 40 hours a week, with time divided between working side-by-side with women leaders 24 hours per week and working on a group project 16 hours each week. The summer enrichment opportunity also includes lunch and learn sessions and field trips to various state government agencies. Students will earn a \$1,700stipend at the end of the program. This year's participating state agencies include the departments of Administration

Commerce, Environmental Quality, Health and Human Services, Information Technology, Natural and Cultural Resources, Public Safety, Revenue, Transportation, Governor's Office, and the Office of State Human Resources. In addition to working on a sustainability project, last year the Lady Cardinal mentees

participated in a geology tour with the NC Department of Environmental Quality, explored the NC Museum of Natural Sciences' Nature Exploration Center, and engaged in lunch and learn sessions with state government leaders among many other educational activities. The Lady Cardinal Mentorship Program purpose and goals are based on recommendations

rom the 2018 Status of Women in NC Employment and Earnings Report released by the Council for Women and Youth Involvement in collaboration with the Institute for Women's Policy Research. The report highlights the growing disparity in employment and earnings among women and men in North Carolina. If unchanged, the gender wage gap will not begin to close until year 2060. The report also underscores Governor Roy Cooper's NC Job Ready Initiative, which advocates for more internships, training, and apprenticeships to prepare North Carolinians for the jobs of today and tomorrow. #### DMV Customers: Beware of Scam Targeting NC Residents The N.C. Division of Motor Vehicles (NCDMV) routinely receives complaints from

customers who have been targeted by scammers claiming to be representatives of either the DMV or the N.C. Department of Transportation. Recently, several law enforcement agencies have reported that many unsuspecting DMV customers are receiving scam emails from a group claiming to be from the "Department of Transportation" and encouraging targeted individuals to click on a link to pay a fine for an alleged driving violation. Customers are encouraged to be aware of any emails from an individual or individuals

using the address "notice@penalty-gov-us" claiming to be from the Traffic Division of the Department of Transportation. The email includes a link to make a payment for a fine. "DMV customers must remain vigilant as criminals try newer ways to defraud customers

and steal their identities," said DMV Commissioner Wayne Goodwin. "If you receive any unexpected email alleging you owe the DMV or the State money, then be very wary and contact the agency to verify the truth of the communication from an official telephone number or email address, but do not use the contact info appearing in the email. Commissioner Goodwin further said, "The NCDMV and the NCDOT will never send

customers an email regarding driving records, driving history, or notices to pay fines related to driving violations. All notifications to customers concerning such violations would be on official letterhead or forms through regular mail." To limit confusion when searching for bona fide DMV services and information:

- Some websites exist that contain DMV information and forms, but they are not officially approved websites. Web searches may return results with other websites, but only the
- official state DMV website ends in ".gov." · Beware of third-party websites offering forms or other information that could be out-of-date or erroneous.
- While not illegal, many of the sites are for profit and ask users to pay for forms. Many sites exist to obtain your information for future marketing, or worse, for using
- your personal information in fraudulent activities. • If you provide payment information on a third-party website, beware that your payment
- card information may be stolen. • Check the "Terms and Conditions" page of the website, where the site states that it is
- not affiliated with any state government agency. • Always remember to look for a website that contains ".gov" in its address to assure
- you are receiving accurate governmental information. • Go to the official NCDMV website www.MyNCDMV.gov.
