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Four Arrested on Methamphetamine Charges

Sheriff's Deputies arrested four individuals at a residence in Peachland on various Methamphetamine charges. Dustin A. Simmons, 18, received the most serious charges, related to manufacturing and selling the dangerous drug.

Sheriff Tommy Allen said, "My deputies went to Simmons' residence on Cappadocia Church Road in Peachland on Sunday, January 22 to serve a warrant for arrest for Possession of Methamphetamine Precursor (items to make Methamphetamine). Once there, they discovered other drugs and paraphernalia." Simmons was arrested on additional charges of Possession and Possession with Intent to Manufacture Methamphetamine; Maintaining a Dwelling to Keep and Sell Methamphetamine; and an additional count of Possession of Methamphetamine Precursor. He was placed in the Anson County Jail under a \$250,000 bond.

Also arrested at the residence were: Michael B. Williams, 23, of Marshville, Brandon W. Pope, 28, of Wadesboro, and Jessica Anne Bearden, 22, of Wadesboro. Williams, Pope and Bearden were all charged with Possession of Methamphetamine Precursor and Manufacturing Methamphetamine. Beardon and Pope were placed in the Anson County Jail under \$75,000 bond, Williams under a \$15,000 bond. Court dates for all the arrested were set for February 27.

The SBI Meth Lab team had to be called in to collect and dispose of the items and chemicals found in the residence. "People need to know, these are very dangerous chemicals. Our officers run a substantial risk walking into these environments. My officers were very lucky this time, as were the individuals in this house. The fumes from meth, when it is being made, can be lethal," stressed Sheriff Allen.

Edgeworth Brought in to Richmond County Jail

Edgeworth and Ronnie Burr awaiting trial on murder charges

Jerry Edgeworth was delivered to the Richmond County Jail on Wednesday, January 18, after serving a twenty-eight month sentence for Possession and Federal Interstate Transportation of Stolen Goods. Edgeworth was relinquished from Clarke County Texas upon the end of his incarceration there.

Sheriff Tommy Allen said, "Edgeworth is in the Richmond county Jail under no bond. He is currently awaiting trial for the murder of Mr. Risden Lyon."

Edgeworth and Ronnie Burr of Wadesboro are both charged in that 1991 murder.

Edgeworth is also facing multiple charges in Anson County. Those charges are: Statutory Rape, Sex Offense with Over Six Year Old, Indecent Liberties with a Child, Crime Against Nature, First Degree Kidnapping, Attempted Second Degree Sex Offense and Assault on a Female.

Wadesboro Has a New Radio Station

First United Methodist Church is broadcasting WEHB-LP, 98.3 FM 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The format is family-friendly music from the 40s to the present, with no commercial interruptions. The station also broadcasts the church service at FUMC every Sunday morning from 10:55 a.m. until noon. WEHB-LP officially signed on in September 2004 as a low-power, limited coverage area radio station.

Lonnie Baucom, chief operator, said that WEHB-LP is not just a church station, but a church station serving the community. As such, it plans to broadcast public service announcements such as school closings, severe weather warnings and other news of interest to the community.

WEHB-LP is the result of over three years of preparation. In December 2002, the late Bill Billingsley, with the help of Dr. Al Joyner, then pastor of FUMC, applied for a construction permit for a low-power FM radio station with the generous help of engineer Jeff Watts of Mocksville, NC. Permission was granted in April 2003. Licensing was obtained from ASCAP, BMI and SESAC in order to

legally play copyrighted music. Equipment was put together from many sources, including broadcasting friends of Billingsley, whose dream was to see the radio station come into being. A fully-automated, computer-run station was set up in an office in the education wing of the church, and an antenna was installed on the H. W. Little and Company hardware building.

While waiting for the necessary permits, Baucom, Jim Bruney and Andrew Puryear added over 3,000 items to the musical library. Music includes not only religious selections from favorite hymns to Christian rock, but golden oldies, big band, country and western, bluegrass, easy listening, and more. Special programming is provided during the Christmas season.

WEHB-LP will be seeking funding in order to meet operating expenses. Individuals and businesses may sponsor "spots" identifying them or their business. The radio station, like public radio, is a non-profit educational station and cannot accept advertising
