Anson County's Unemployment Rate a Low 5.5% in November

Anson County's unemployment rate continued to be low during November. In November it was 5.5%, unchanged from October. The actual labor force, employed and unemployed numbers for October and November were almost identical. Statewide the unemployment rate in November was 4.8%, down only slight from October's 4.9%.

Anson's total labor force in November was 10,892. Of that number 10,296 were employed and 596 were unemployed. In October the total labor force was 10,904, with 10,299 employed and 605 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 66 of North Carolina's counties in November, decreased in 23, and remained unchanged in 11. Hyde County had the highest unemployment rate at 9.4 percent, while Buncombe County and Orange County each had the lowest at 3.7 percent. Six of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases, five decreased, and four remained unchanged.

Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 6.8 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.9 percent. The November not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.8 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 98 counties, increased in one, and remained unchanged in one. Fourteen metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year and one remained unchanged.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in November by 2,112 to 4,661,632, while those unemployed decreased 2,412 to 234,214. Since November 2015, the number of workers employed statewide increased 137,505, while those unemployed decreased 25,723.

Bridge Replacement Project in Anson

The N.C. Department of Transportation stated that they would begin a project to replace the bridge over Big Branch Cribs Creek on Burnsville Church Road north of Burnsville on Monday, January 23, weather permitting.


While crews replace the existing structure, motorists will be detoured along Rocky Mount Church Road, Wightman Church Road, and NC 742 back to Burnsville Church Road.

Those who are over the age of 60 remember well that when your car needed a fill up you went to a service station. And, all service stations were just what their name implied, service for your automobile. When you pulled up to the pumps the attendant came out to see how he could help you, usually asking, "Fill 'er up?" Once he had the pump going, and while he cleaned your windshield, he would ask, "Check your oil?" Attendants would even check your tire pressures and help with any other things your car might need - all while you were there just to get gas. And, there was no extra charge for these services. The attendant would then accept payment for your gas at the car window, and you would be on your way, never having had to step out of your vehicle. Can you imagine!

The last two service stations in Wadesboro that performed that service are still open and still providing first class vehicle care, they just no longer sell gas. They are Allen Snuggs at Wadesboro Car Care (704-694-3772) and Alan Jackson at East Wade Gulf (704-694-2787).

Affordable Care Act Open Enrollment Period Ends Jan. 31

North Carolinians can enroll or re-enroll in health insurance plans now

North Carolinians can enroll or re-enroll in quality, affordable health coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace now.

During the open-enrollment period, which runs from Nov. 1 to Jan. 31, uninsured North Carolinians will be able to enter the Health Insurance Marketplace and select plans that fit their needs and budgets. People who currently have coverage through the Marketplace should check the website to learn about new options and ensure they are getting the correct amount of financial help.

For many North Carolinians, affordability is a real concern in their health care decision-making. In the past, high premium costs have forced many to go without health insurance simply because they could not afford it. The good news is that financial assistance is available to help people pay for plans – in fact, 92% of North Carolinians who signed up for Affordable Care Act coverage received financial assistance to make their plan more affordable.

The NC Navigator Consortium and Enroll America are urging North Carolinians to check out Affordable Care Act plans. In the last enrollment period, over 613,000 N.C. residents enrolled in health coverage through the Marketplace, providing them with the peace of mind that comes with protecting themselves and their families. This coming open-enrollment period is the next opportunity North Carolinians have to take advantage of the coverage options available through the Marketplace.

We encourage North Carolinians to check out their health care coverage options in the upcoming enrollment period," said Jennifer Simmons, director of the NC Navigator Consortium. "We have in-person assisters in all counties across North Carolina who can questions and help them mal down face-to-face with consumers for free to answer the best coverage decision for them and their families." North Carolinians can find free in-person assisters available in their communities by calling 1-855-733-3711 or using the Get Covered Connector tool at www.gcaconnector.org. In-person assisters in Eastern North Carolina will accommodate scheduling needs of people affected by Hurricane Matthew. Enroll America's North Carolina State Director Sorien Schmidt said North Carolinians who are losing coverage because their insurance providers are leaving the Marketplace should take advantage of the available in-person assisters and review plans that are still vailable to them. 'There are still many health insurance options for North Carolinians through the Marketplace and we encourage those who need to re-enroll to review plans available to them," said Schmidt. "We will continue working as a team to reach out to the uninsured wherever they are with the information they need to get covered and make they receive the most up-to-date financial package available to them.' While the fourth open-enrollment period provides an opportunity for North Carolinians to gain access to quality, affordable health care, it also gives people a chance to avoid paying a fine when they file their taxes. Those who do not enroll in a plan by Jan. 31, 2017, could face a fine of \$695 or 2.5% of their yearly income, whichever is greater. The NC Navigator Consortium is a group of 13 health care, social service, and legal aid organizations that helps North Carolina consumers enroll in affordable health insurance plans under the Affordable Care Act. Do not mix any objects such as limbs, bricks, rocks or building debris with the leaves. Town employees can be seriously injured and equipment can be damaged by objects mixed with the leaves. Please place these items in separate piles for collection. Mixed debris in with the leaves will not be picked up.

The leaf truck follows the same route as the garbage truck follows. Please be patient, as it usually takes approximately two weeks to complete the entire town once. When the leaves really begin to fall, it will take even longer to complete the routes.

Remember to have all of your leaves out for pickup before February 1. Leaf collection will stop on this date.
