While she remained a loyal member of All Souls Episcopal Church in Ansonville (serving as Treasurer for many years), she also attended Calvary Episcopal Church in Wadesboro where she sang in the choir and belonged to the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) group. Jennie is remembered by her children as their rock, always strong, reliable and determined. Certainly she balanced her work and other home demands, but first and foremost she cared for her children; she was fiercely determined to protect them and never failed to remind them how much they were loved. Jennie's love and support extended to her larger family as well. Nothing pleased her more than to host her extended family Christmas Eve dinners, complete with extensive decorations and, of course, a meal that only Jennie could prepare. This event became known by the family as "Jennie's Super Bowl."

Friends remember Jennie as a beautifully dressed, perfectly accessorized, good natured woman who was never drawn into the drama that life in a small town could bring. She was genuine and uncomplaining, looked for the best in a situation, and paid no attention to naysayers. Jennie was truly one who chose to "bloom where you are planted." Evelyn was born on August 5, 1922, in the small community of Cool Springs outside of Statesville, NC to the late Earl Durant Mayes, Sr, and the late Ethel Shoemaker Mayes.

She began her working years with the Department of Agriculture office in Statesville followed by a position at a local bank, the beginning of a decades-long career in banking. On February 8, 1946, she married David Townley Redfearn and moved to Townley's family farm just outside Wadesboro. Together they grew the farm into a large dairy, row crop, and timber operation.

Evelyn worked at First National Bank (later Southern National, then BB&T) where she met much of Anson County's population. She was known for her friendliness and ready smile. At the same time, she shared in the management of the farm while raising three daughters, Lyn, Rosie and Mary Townley.

In May 1969 Townley was killed in a timber accident. Evelyn continued working at the bank while overseeing the farm operations, eventually focusing on timber farming. In 1978 she married Bill Capel, Sr. and gained a son, Bill Jr. At the age of 67 she retired from BB&T as an assistant vice president.

Following Bill's unexpected death in 1990, Evelyn found solace in visiting her children and grandchildren, making countless drives to Winston-Salem, Durham and Norfolk, VA. At 69, she still entertained her beloved grandchildren by turning cartwheels in the yard. As the years passed, Evelyn continued gardening, antiquing and working on ever-present projects.

In 2008 at the age of 86, Evelyn moved from the family farm into town and became a familiar sight walking Wadesboro's hilly streets as she "made her rounds" and puttered in her yard. Although becoming wheelchair-bound and eventually confined by COVID restrictions, she regularly attended church and went out for Sunday lunch thanks to her devoted son Bill. Her faith and her commitment to the First United Methodist Church of Wadesboro were very important parts of her life.

Evelyn kept her home the family gathering place as spouses joined the family and grandchildren and great-grandchildren were born. She was the absolute heart of her family and was never happier than when she was surrounded by those she loved. She taught the value of family and served as a wonderful example of what it is to be a mother, grandmother and great-grandmother.
