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Ratliff & Ratliff, Inc.

Among the first big trucks and trailers that I lettered were those of Ratliff & Ratliff, Inc. The year was about 1946 that I began lettering "big" trucks for Steele Ratliff usually White, Mack, International, etc. - but, always red!

Steele stayed in the long distance hauling while brother Lawrence developed a great business of earth moving, grading and the like. Brother Charles organized Morven Freight Lines, competing with rail freight and Railway Express.

Each of the above fellows could be a story in his own right.

Back to the trailer in the picture - even though this to me was a very big piece of equipment, it would be a small unit as compared to trailers of today. I painted the trailer above in 1956 - with red 34 inch letters and black 2 inch shadow (Steele's favorite colors). (Of course the colors do not show up in the picture - because I was using a very

early Polaroid 95 camera and color film wasn't ready at the time.)

The letters were painted on the stainless steel corrugated body - the corrugations were a half inch apart and a half inch deep. Now those jobs were the ones that required hours and hours - sometimes days to do, even though I used (later on) an air brush on the big side letters, and a regular sign brush on the smooth stainless skirting (where we painted the name, address company permit/unit numbers).

Some North and South Carolina granite was trucked all the way to California by Ratliff - and when I asked about what kind of price to haul "rock" to California, Steele would grin and say, "Oh, about \$25 added to the average tombstone!" Would you even dare to compare those hauling costs to this day and time's rates?!

Steele died some years back with his trucking company.

- going to sleep, and don't let pets or children play too close to a space heater. • Space heaters are only meant to provide supplemental heat and should never
- be used to warm bedding, cook food, dry clothing or thaw pipes. • Install smoke alarms on every floor of your home and outside all sleeping areas
- and test them once a month. • Proper placement of space heaters is critical. Heaters must be kept at least three
