## Now Available Online: NC 1099-G Tax Forms for Unemployment Benefits

Division of Employment Security also mailing hard copy forms if previously requested

People who were paid unemployment benefits in 2023 can now view or download their 1099-G tax statements through their secure, online account accessible from the N.C. Division of Employment Security's website. A paper copy will be mailed by January 31 to those who requested it, with an expected delivery date in early February.

The Division of Employment Security (DES) prepares an IRS Form 1099-G for each person who received unemployment benefits. The form reports the total amount in unemployment benefits a person received in the previous calendar year, plus any state or federal taxes that were withheld. This amount is based upon the actual payment dates and may include the total of benefits from more than one claim.

Individuals need the 1099-G form to complete their state and federal tax returns. Unemployment benefits are counted as part of a person's income and must be reported on federal and state tax returns. DES generated nearly 84,000 forms this year.

To access the 1099-G form electronically:

 Log into your Claimant Account, online at des.nc.gov. Click on "View My 1099G" in the menu on the lefthand side. People who believe the information on their 1099-G

form is incorrect can contact the DES Customer Call Center at 888-737-0259.

If you receive a 1099-G tax statement but did not file for unemployment benefits, you may be the victim of identity theft. If you suspect unemployment benefits fraud, you should report it using the online fraud reporting form or contact DES at 919-701-3543. DES must investigate and confirm fraud to correct the 1099-G.

# NC's December Employment Figures

The state's seasonally adjusted December 2023 unemployment rate was 3.5%, unchanged from November's revised rate. The national rate remained unchanged at 3.7%.

North Carolina's unemployment rate decreased 0.3 of a percentage point from a year ago. The number of people employed decreased 1,622 over the month to 5,093,994and increased 131,769 over the year. The number of people unemployed increased 3,085 over the month to 185,281 and decreased 12,762 over the year. Seasonally adjusted Total Nonfarm employment, as gathered

through the monthly establishment survey, increased 2,100 to 4,951,900 in December. Major industries experiencing increases were Leisure & Hospitality Services, 2.500; Education & Health Services, 1,500; Professional & Business Services, 1,100; Government, 800; and Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 800. Major industries experiencing decreases were Other

Services, 2,100; Information, 1,000; Financial Activities, 800; Construction, 600; and Mining & Logging, 100. Manufacturing employment remained unchanged. Since December 2022, Total Nonfarm jobs increased

99,400 with the Total Private sector increasing by 82,400 and Government increasing by 17,000. Major industries experiencing increases were Education & Health Services, 35,000; Professional & Business Services, 23,100; Leisure & Hospitality Services, 21,000; Government, 17,000; Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 11,300; Financial Activities, 2,700; and Mining & Logging, 200. Major industries experiencing decreases Manufacturing, 4,000; Construction, 3,700; Other Services, 2,100; and Information, 1,100.

## \$82 Million in New Investments to Connect Thousands of North Carolinians to High-Speed Internet

One program, the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), offers discounts on internet service and devices to eligible citizens. Must apply by February 7.

Governor Roy Cooper joined President Joe Biden in Raleigh on Thursday, January 18 to announce \$82 million in new investments from the American Rescue Plan's Capital Projects Fund that will connect at least 16,000 North Carolina homes and businesses to high-speed internet as part of the Biden-Harris Administration's Investing in America agenda. This \$82 million award will fund Governor Cooper's Stop-Gap Solutions Program aimed at delivering reliable high-speed internet access to the state's hardest to reach locations.

We are grateful for the Biden-Harris Administration's unwavering commitment to closing the digital divide here in North Carolina and across the nation," said Governor Cooper. "Accessing the internet is a necessity in today's world, and President Biden has continued to be an invaluable partner in our efforts to not only connect North Carolinians to reliable, high-speed internet, but also ensure that they can afford it."

Overall, the Biden-Harris Administration is investing over \$3 billion in North Carolina through the American Rescue Plan and Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to help connect families and businesses to reliable and affordable internet. Using \$1 billion in American Rescue Plan Act funding, North Carolina will connect over 300,000 homes and businesses to high-speed internet by 2026. The state has already put this funding toward nearly \$350 million in Growing Rural Economies with Access to Technology (GREAT) grants to connect 137,646 households and 4,441 businesses in 92 counties, along with \$22 million in Completing Access to Broadband (CAB) program awards that will connect 6,012 more households and 164 businesses in 14 counties to high-speed internet. American Rescue Plan funds are also supporting efforts to increase access to devices and digital literacy and skills training.

North Carolina is also receiving more than \$1.5 billion from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program that will be used to connect all North Carolinians to affordable, reliable high-speed internet service.

In addition, Governor Cooper has joined the Biden-Harris Administration in urging Congress to continue funding the Affordable Connectivity Program that helps millions of U.S. households, including nearly 900,000 in North Carolina, afford reliable high-speed internet. Without Congressional action, 22.6 million U.S. households will see a significant spike in their internet bill and potentially lose service entirely when current funding is projected to end in mid-2024.
