This prepared her to join the State Department as a secretary in 1950. After a brief time in South Korea she was assigned to Vietnam.

She and William Henry Huntley met in Saigon, Vietnam in 1950, when each one was employed by the U.S. Government - Ruby as secretary at the Embassy and Henry as air attaché to France serving in the U.S. Air Force. They loved their jobs and enjoyed the social life. At that time only 100 Americans were based in Vietnam. When Henry was assigned to a base in Long Island, New York in 1953, the couple married and then had two children - Pamela in 1954 and Billy in 1959. During Henry's Air Force career in several locations, the family always visited relatives and friends in Anson County at least annually. Henry's career took the family to Montgomery, Al; Honolulu, Hawaii; the Washington, D.C. area; and San Antonio, TX.
