

Wildlife Commission Offers Free **Turkey Hunting Seminars Statewide**

The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission and the National Wild Turkey Federation are offering 11 free turkey hunting seminars across the state in March. The seminars, which will be held from 6 to 9 p.m., are open on a first-come, first-served basis and participants 16 years old and younger will need parental permission to register. Pre-registration is required and participants must register online at www.ncwildlife.org.

Topics will include biology, hunting methods, calls and decoys, firearms and ammo selection, camouflage clothing, and turkey processing and cooking techniques. Each seminar will conclude with a Q&A session and a brief overview of R3 (hunter recruitment, retention and re-activation) initiatives.

"Since 2015, the National Wild Turkey Federation has partnered with us to offer

these seminars to increase participation in hunting while also maintaining conservation of wildlife and their habitats," said Walter "Deet" James, the Commission's hunting heritage biologist. "Although open to all skill levels, this "all-in-one" seminar is specifically created for those who are interested in turkey hunting, but don't know how to get started. It's especially suited for people who lack an existing hunting mentor."

The closest seminar to Anson County will be held on Thursday, March 14 at the Richmond County Extension Center, located at 123 Caroline Street in Rockingham. More dates and locations are available at www.ncwildlife.org.

The statewide season for male or bearded turkey only is April 13 through May 11, with a youth-only week from April 6-12. Regulations and restrictions on turkey hunting, including information on youth season, are available in the 2018-19 Inland Fishing, Hunting and Trapping Regulations Digest, available at www.ncwildlife.org.

Auto Insurance Companies Ask for 7.6% Rate Increase

The North Carolina Rate Bureau (NCRB) submitted its annual auto insurance filing with the N.C. Department of Insurance and is requesting an overall statewide average increase of 7.6 percent, announced Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey. The NCRB represents the state's insurance companies and is a separate entity from

the N.C. Department of Insurance. By law, the NCRB must submit auto rate filings with the Department every

The filing will be reviewed and if the Department does not agree with the need

for the requested rates, it can negotiate a settlement or call for a hearing. In 2017, the NCRB requested a 13.8 percent increase, but Commissioner Causey negotiated a 2.2 percent increase – which saved N.C. consumers more than \$1 billion. The settlement also included an agreement the NCRB would not make a filing in 2018.

North Carolina is one of the least expensive states for car insurance. In 2018, Business Insider, Forbes and Insure.com ranked N.C. as the tenth least expensive state in the nation for auto insurance.

BBB Releases Top 5 Scams of 2018

The Better Business Bureau serving Southern Piedmont and Western North Carolina has identified the top five scams of 2018. Skyrocketing to the top, unsurprisingly, are scams that include online purchases. Helping escalate these scams are fake websites that continue to evolve and pop-up everywhere touting deeply discounted prices and too-good-to-be- true offers. According to experts, 1.4 million fake websites are created every month, with

criminals replacing some of these websites every few hours. By doing this, cyber criminals make it difficult for web crawlers to find their fraudulent pages and block them. 'We consistently warn consumers about fake websites and shopping online, and

remind them that if a price looks too good to be true, it probably is" says Tom Bartholomy, president of the Better Business Bureau serving Southern Piedmont and Western NC. "Scammers have been doing such a great job building fake websites with enticing offers, that often times it's difficult to tell that it's fraudulent at first glance." Below is a look at the top five scams of 2018.

- 1. Online Purchases Feature a convincing website or online offer that leave customers spending lots of money without the product(s) they ordered. 2. Employment Scams Offers to work from home might sound great, but
- oftentimes they're not. Receiving checks in the mail and being asked to forward them on to another address, or playing a middle-man of sorts, is also very common. 3. Fake Checks / Money Order A victim receives a check in the mail for much
- more than expected and is then told to cash the check, keep some of the money and send the rest back or to another person. In reality, the check is fake, and the victim is on the hook for the entirety of the funds.
- 4. Phishing Includes a series of fake emails requesting money or personal
- 5. Tax Collection Scammers pretend to be from the IRS. They call and say the

victim will be arrested if they don't pay their back taxes immediately.
