## **Anson County's December Unemployment Rate at a Low 4.9%**

Anson County's unemployment rate for December dropped slightly to 4.9% from November's 5.1% rate. Statewide the unemployment rate was 4.4% in December.

Anson's total labor force in December was 10,312. Of that number 9,802 were employed and 510 were unemployed. In November the total labor force was 10,486 with 9,946 employed and 540 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 56 of North Carolina's counties in December, increased in 20, and remained unchanged in 24. Hyde County had the highest unemployment rate at 10.6 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.4 percent. Eleven of the state's metro areas experienced rate

decreases and four remained unchanged. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 6.3 percent had the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.6 percent. The December not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.4% When compared to the same month last year, not

seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in

98 counties and remained unchanged in two. All 15 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year. The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in December by 37,295 to 4,684,502, while those unemployed decreased 6,047 to 215,792. Since December 2016, the number of workers

employed statewide increased 34,669, while those

unemployed decreased 22,548.

## **Governor Cooper Launches** "Hometown Strong" to **Support North Carolina's Rural Communities**

Through existing and new partnerships with local leaders from government, business, non-profit organizations, the philanthropic community and others, Hometown Strong will seek to leverage state and local resources to help complete local development projects, convene conversations between state and local agencies, and identify long-term projects that can encourage prosperity in rural communities.

"Helping rural North Carolina thrive is one of my top Gov. Cooper said. "Families in rural communities aren't looking for mandates from Raleigh they want state government to listen and help when asked. We'll listen to local leaders to make sure they're getting the

support they need to help their communities prosper." Gov. Cooper has appointed Pryor Gibson and Mary Penny Kelley to lead Hometown Strong. Initial partnerships between rural counties

Hometown Strong will announced this spring. Pryor Gibson, a Wadesboro native, is a former member of the North

Carolina General Assembly who represented House District 96, which includes Anson, Montgomery, and Union counties. He also served as executive vice president of the North Association and as senior adviser for Carolina Forestry governmental affairs for Governor Bev Perdue.

Mary Penny Kelley formerly served as senior advisor for policy and innovation at the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality, where she had also served as an executive attorney for nearly a decade. Additionally, she served as an Assistant Attorney General within the North Carolina Department of Justice and as an attorney in private practice. Kelley is a resident of Spring Hope.

"When you face a challenge in small towns like mine, you solve it by bringing everyone around the table. That's an idea that state government could use more of,' said Gibson. "There is so much to be excited about in North Carolina's rural communities and Governor Cooper has made it clear that they should have a real partner in Raleigh. I look forward to getting to work.

### Johnny Lee Robinson Charged with Attempted First Degree Murder

Friday, February 2 and charged him with Attempted First Degree Murder stemming from an incident that took place last week. One of the victims was seriously injured. According to police, Robinson approached Ricky Gerald Hough, Sr.,

a 51 year old white male, and April Little Hough, a 37 year old black female, at the Stop-n-Shop store in Wadesboro, and fired at least eight shots. Ricky

Hough was struck in the neck and twice in the arm. April Hough was not injured. Ricky Hough was taken to CMC Main and reported to be in stable condition. Warrants were obtained for the arrest of Robinson, and after a manhunt he was arrested. Robinson was charged with Attempted First Degree Murder,

Assault with a Deadly Weapon with Intent to Kill Inflicting Serious Injury, and Possession of a Firearm by a Felon. He is being held in the Anson County Jail under a \$500,000 bond. His first court date was set for February 6.

Robinson has a prior arrest record.
