SBI Released Findings in Death During October Probation Arrest

The State Bureau of Investigation has released the autopsy of an Anson County man who died while being taken into custody by a Probation and Parole Officer on October 27, 2016. According to the report Lamont Darryl Perry, who collapsed while being placed under arrest by Officer William Torrence, died from a combination of cocaine use, sickle cell disease and physical exertion. At the time, Torrence was arresting Perry for a probation violation related to an assault on a female charge. Several Wadesboro Police officers were on the scene and witnessed the encounter.

The incident took place at Perry's girlfriend's residence in Wadesboro. Perry fled from the officers and was located in a wooded area near the residence within minutes. After Perry was arrested and handcuffed officers noticed that he had an injury to his leg, and summoned medical assistance. Officers stated that Perry was talking during that time, but he became unresponsive and died. No gun or taser was used during the encounter.

The SBI submitted their findings to the Anson County District Attorney, and no charges have been filed against Probation Officer Torrence.

Unemployment Rate 5.6% in December

Anson County's unemployment rate for December was 5.6%, basically unchanged from November's 5.5%. Statewide the unemployment rate in December was 4.9%. Anson's total labor force in December was 10,868. Of hat number 10,259 were employed and 609 were unem: ployed. In November the total labor force was 10,892, with 10,296 employed and 596 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 71 of North Carolina's counties in December, decreased in 9, and remained unchanged in 20. Hyde County had the highest unemployment rate at 11.6 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.7 percent.

Eleven of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases and four remained unchanged. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 7.0 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 4.0 percent. The December not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.9 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 97 counties, increased in one, and remained unchanged in two. Fourteen metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year and one remained unchanged.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in December by 290 to 4,661,550, while those unemployed increased 5,538 to 239,491. Since December 2015, the number of workers employed statewide increased 153,223, while those unemployed decreased 10,780.

3) Use the back burners. Kids love to reach, so to prevent hot food or liquid spills in the kitchen, simply use the back burner of your stove and turn pot handles away from the stove edge. Keep hot foods away from the edge of your counters.

NC Auto Insurance Companies Ask for 13.8% Rate Hike

Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey announced on February 3 that the Department of Insurance has received the annual auto insurance rate filing from the North Carolina Rate Bureau. The Bureau, which represents the auto insurance companies in the state, requested an overall statewide average increase of 13.8 percent for 2017. This rate filing is the first auto rate filing the Department of Insurance has received

from the Rate Bureau since 2009. The last auto rate increases occurred in 2001 and 2002 but were wiped out by the rate decrease that occurred in 2003. The filing will be reviewed by Department officials in the coming months. If officials do

not agree with the requested rates, they will be negotiated with the North Carolina Rate Bureau. If a settlement cannot be reached within 60 days, a hearing will be called.

Settlements have been reached on rate filings in the past but if the case goes to a hearing, the hearing officer will rule on rates and any appeal would go through the court sys-

tem. The rates set in these cases represent the highest amount allowable for all companies to charge. Companies can and regularly do offer discounts to their policyholders.
