#### Extension Notes When the Power Goes Out

We dodged a bullet, as they like to say, in this past ice storm. The ice could have been a whole lot worse, and our power companies and linemen have done an outstanding job preparing lines for winter weather. Our power only blinked twice. Thank you more than we can say! However, you never know when the big one will hit, and this is an El Nino year. It is always better to be safe than sorry, and we may not be so lucky with that bullet next time. So prepare now for power outages due to winter weather. Here are a few tips for planning in regards to food.

Place a thermometer in your fridge and freezer, so that you will know how cold or warm it is if the power goes out. Freeze containers of water for ice to help keep appliances cold. Plan ahead by preparing coolers and knowing where ice suppliers are and how you can get to them.

Have food items on hand that do not require refrigeration and can be eaten cold or heated on an outdoor grill. Have a tip-sensitive digital thermometer ready to check foods for both storing and cooking temperatures.

If you do have a power outage, keep doors closed as much as possible to maintain the cold temperature. With the door closed, food in most freezers will stay below 41 degrees for up to three days. A closed fridge will keep food below 41 degrees only about four hours.

Thawing rates in freezers depend on the amount of food in the freezer, the kind of food, the temperature of the food and the size and insulation of the freezer. That is where the frozen containers of water come in. Fill up empty space to keep food frozen longer.

And if the power goes out, what can you keep? Foods that can safely be stored above 41 degrees for a few days include whole non-cut fresh fruits and vegetables, ketchup, relishes, olives, jams and jellies, mustard, bbq sauce, soy sauce, bread, rolls, bagels, cakes (without cream or custard), cookies, muffins and certain hard cheeses.

You can also safely refreeze foods that still contain ice crystals or that have been kept at 41 degrees or below. Remember that unsafe food may not appear or smell to be spoiled. So err on the side of caution, and if in doubt, throw it out. By Janine B. Rywak, County Extension Director
