



# **Regional Water Quality Preventative Maintenance Program**

**WHAT:** In a continuing effort to distribute high quality potable water, the above listed water utilities will conduct a routine Water Quality Preventative Maintenance Program. This program will involve temporarily switching water disinfectants from the present chloramines to free chlorine in order to optimize water quality within the distribution systems.

WHEN: Monday, February 23, 2015 through Sunday, March 22, 2015

**WHERE:** *Union County:* Public water systems in Weddington, Wesley Chapel, Waxhaw, Marvin, Indian Trail, Stallings, Wingate, Marshville, Fairview, Unionville, and unincorporated areas of Union County served by Union County Public Works.

*Anson County:* Public water systems in Wadesboro, Morven, Lilesville, Peachland, Polkton, Marshville, & Ansonville, and unincorporated areas of Anson County, as well as portions of Chesterfield County, SC, served by Anson County Public Works.

*Lancaster County:* Public water systems in the cities of Lancaster, Health Springs, and Kershaw, and unincorporated areas of Lancaster County served by LCWSD.

**COMMENTS:** During the Preventative Maintenance Program, some water customers may notice temporary taste, color or odor differences in their water. This is a normal component of the process and customers should be reassured that water quality is not affected and remains safe for drinking, bathing, cooking and other general uses. Most customers will not notice any change.

There are three groups of water users that should take special precautions during the Preventative Maintenance Program: 1) hospitals & kidney dialysis providers/patients, 2) fish, pond, pool and aquarium owners/ operators, and 3) some business that use water in their production process. Those who fall in to any of the above categories are strongly encouraged to seek professional advice concerning the removal methods for chlorine and chloramines from their water supply.

This maintenance program is being performed at this time of year when water usage is low, as not to stress the water distribution system during times of higher demands, such as summer. You may see crews performing flushing operations at hydrants to insure chlorinated water is dispersed through the entire water system.

Once the water distribution systems have been completely and adequately treated and flushed, the disinfection process will be switched back to chloramines and re-introduced into the water distribution systems.

On Tuesday, February 24 the Cooperative Extension Service and Rocky River Local Foods will host the first Southern Piedmont Local Foods Producers' Conference at the Union County Agriculture Center. On-line early registration cost is \$25 per person and includes a fine local foods meal catered by local eateries along with the featured presentation from nationally renowned Chris Blanchard who will discuss efficiency, scaling, marketing, and operations with real-life examples and humor. Specialists will provide workshops on a variety of local food topics including grape production, blueberry production, high tunnel and season extension, livestock management, marketing, land management, and pesticide application.

Chris Blanchard provides consulting and education for farming, food, and business through Flying Rutabaga Works. As the owner and operator of Rock Spring Farm since 1999, Chris raised twenty acres of vegetables, herbs, and greenhouse crops, marketed through a 200-member year-round CSA, food stores, and farmers markets. Prior to 1999, Chris managed student farms, worked as an intern, packing house manager, plant breeding assistant, and farm manager, and provided consulting for a major organic processor, in California, Wisconsin, Maine, and Washington state. His workshops, writing, and consulting throughout the country about farm business concepts, food safety, organic vegetable production, and scaling-up have gained a reputation for fresh approaches, down-to-earth information, and honesty.

The conference begins at 9 am with an opening session including light snacks from local eateries. There are sessions provided throughout the day by state Extension specialists and agents on topics including: greenhouse production, blueberry production, grape production, marketing, cost sharing and land management programs, pesticides, livestock management, small flock poultry management, and business decision making.

Between sessions and the meal there will be a trade show featuring local and regional vendors for equipment, packaging supplies, seed, beekeeping supplies, general information, tools, feed, and professional services.

Free assistance is designed to help taxpayers fill out forms 1040EZ, 1040A, 1040 and the North Carolina return.

Persons using the service should bring this year tax package, age and earnings statements (forms W-2) received from employers, interest statements from banks (form

1099-INT), a copy of last year tax return and any other relevant information concerning income and expenses. Electronic filing of returns will be available.
