## **Anson County Early College Students Complete the Certified Nursing Assistant I Program**

Anson County Early College Students recently completed the Certified Nursing Assistant I Program through South Piedmont Community College. This is the first group of Early College students who have completed the program, and we are very proud of their accomplishments.

The students who completed the program are Kiante Clark, Emily Dalrymple, Juacara Diggs, Avah Gardelle, Kathryn McRae, Keeley Pope, Kaytlin Teal and Kaylee Wess. These students plan to continue their studies at a four year university in the fall and are interested in pursuing a career in nursing or another medical-related field.

To meet program requirements students had to complete classroom coursework hours and clinical hours at a skilled nursing facility. Once the students completed the coursework and clinical hours they were eligible to take the Nursing Assistant I State Exam, and upon successful completion of the exam they can get a job as a Certified Nursing Assistant.

Kathryn McRae (pictured at right), one of the students who completed this program, currently has a job as a Certified Nursing Assistant at an assisted living facility. This is a great experience for her before she goes to a four year university in the fall to further her education in nursing. Several nursing programs across the country now require students to have their Certified Nursing Assistant requirements met before applying to nursing school. This is just another way we are helping to further our student's education before going onto a four year university.
