2012

- Due to extreme funding cuts, the TOP program was terminated after providing services to teens for 12 years.

- After 17 years of service, the TIPS program was terminated due to loss of funding.
- Anson County ranked as one of the top 10 generous counties in the United States per capita in Philanthropy Today.
- Dana Maness, ACPC Board Chair, received the Ashley O. Thrift Volunteer Award for outstanding leadership.

- ACPC and the Anson County Domestic Violence Coalition placed 1,000 blue pinwheels in the front of the Anson County Court House during the Week of the Young Child for Prevent Child Abuse Month.
- The first annual Play Daze for the NC Pre-K students at Little Park was a success with approximately 150 children in
- Raising a Reader expands to serve more than 600 children in Anson County.
- ACPC sponsored Ready Rosie, a text messaging system providing parents videos with developmentally appropriate activities to engage in with their children.

 ACPC set a fundraising record, securing more than \$82,000 at Barn Blast for Partnership programs.

- ACPC launched Proud Parents which is a playgroup model designed to provide children with intentional, developmentally appropriate learning experiences and provides caregivers with information, resources, support, and connections to promote optimal child development.
- In collaboration with Atrium Healthcare, NC Pre-K teachers trained on Healthy Together 5210 to launch at all NC Pre-K sites.

2020

- The global pandemic altered everyday operations for most people as COVID-19 entered the USA. Many businesses, schools, and organizations moved to virtual operations to reduce in-person contact to slow the spread of the virus.
- · ACPC distributed paper towels, bleach, toilet paper, hand sanitizer, and milk to childcare providers unable to find the resources during the shortage.
- ACPC collaborated with Anson County Schools to deliver approximately 5,000 school meals during the pandemic.
- ACPC delivered more than 500 food boxes to families in the county during the pandemic.
- Despite the pandemic, more than 140 providers have attended professional development trainings through the Partnership.
- ACPC launched a YouTube channel for the virtual Raising a Reader program and offered learn-at-home bags with books and activities.
