

Hospital Earns ACR Accreditation

Anson Community Hospital has been awarded a threeyear term of accreditation in mammography as the result of a recent review by the American College of Radiology (ACR). Mammography is a specific type of imaging test that uses a low-dose x-ray system to examine breasts. A mammography exam, called a mammogram, is used to aid in the early detection and diagnosis of breast diseases in women.

The ACR gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting ACR Practice Guidelines and Technical Standards after a peer-review evaluation by board-certified

physicians and medical physicists who are experts the in field. Image quality, personnel qualifications, adequacy of facility




equipment, quality control procedures, and quality assurance programs are assessed. The findings are reported to the ACR Committee on Accreditation, which subsequently provides the practice with a comprehensive report they can use for continuous practice improvement.

The ACR is a national professional organization serving more than 36,000 diagnostic/interventional radiologists, radiation oncologists, nuclear medicine physicians, and medical physicists with programs focusing on the practice of medical imaging and radiation oncology and the delivery of comprehensive health care services.

SPCC Celebrates Legacy of System 'Godfather'

In May of 1963 the General Assembly established the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS). Dr. W. Dallas Herring, then Chair of the State Board of Education, is considered the philosophical godfather of the state's community college system. Along with the other 58 colleges in the system, South Piedmont Community College held a special commemoration on March 6.

Herring is best known for his belief that education should be available to all and that community colleges should "...take people from where they are, as far as they can go.

'Dr. Herring's initial plan for industrial education led to our statewide system for educating people of all ages, training the state's workforce and providing college transfer options," said Dr. Stan Sidor, President of South Piedmont Community College.

On the campus in Monroe Tom Crooke, chairman of the board of trustees for the college, and Marcus X, an alumnus of South Piedmont, unveiled a portrait of Herring that was commissioned by the North Carolina Community Colleges Foundation.

'Marcus X overcame a tremendous amount of adversity to achieve his education goals," said Elaine Clodfelter, Vice President of Student Services at South Piedmont Com-



munity College. "While at South Piedmont he served in a leadership role for Student Government Association, established the HVAC Club and earned entry into Phi Theta Kappa, the national honor society for community colleges. It's fitting that he help us to commemorate Dr. Herring." At graduation this May the college will honor Marcus X with the Dallas Herring Achievement Award. NCCCS established this award in 2010 to recognize achievement of students and alumni.


