Harris Chapel A.M.E. Zion Church **Holds Sesquicentennial Celebration**

That's 150 years! Harris Chapel is Anson's first African American church.

In the year of 1865, little did the men and women of Harris Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church know when they chose to worship under a brush arbor in Morven, NC on Highway 145 South that they were making history as the first African American church in Anson County. On Saturday morning, March 7, 2015, members of Harris Chapel began the commemoration of the $150 \mathrm{th}$ anniversary of their church with a simple brush arbor service held outside under the trees.

Those in attendance shared fond memories which span nearly 70 years ago. Balloons were released at the end of the service in memory of their forefathers. Having chosen the theme "Remembering, Celebrating and Renewing Our Purpose" for the occasion, members centered all activities around it.

On Sunday morning, March 8, former pastor Dr. Charlotte Brown delivered the morn-

ing message, "Upon this Rock." Dr. Brown is currently a second term District Court Judge in Mecklenburg County. Bishop George Battle, Jr., the Senior Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church and Presiding Prelate of the Piedmont Episcopal District, delivered the afternoon anniversary message, "The Journey." Marilynn Bennett, the Anniversary Committee Chairperson, presented the church history. It was an honor and the first time that the Bishop has visited and worshipped with the Harris Chapel Church family. Known for his benevolence, Bishop Battle blessed Com-

missioner Vancine Sturdivant, CEO of Faith-Based Center of Hope with not only a personal, generous monetary offering, but also directed his wife, Missionary Supervisor Iris J. Battle, to give to Mrs. Sturdivant's agency the blankets and coats collected this year by the A.M.E. Zion churches. This unexpected, overwhelming act of kindness moved Commissioner Sturdivant to tears and left her speechless for a brief moment. The church's oldest active members, Mr. Edward Capel, 96 years old, and Mrs. Tom-
