USDA North Carolina Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, SED Aaron Martin announced that farmers and ranchers in North Carolina now have a more efficient, timely option for receiving important FSA program eligibility requirements, deadlines and related information.

#### ACEC Presents The Beverly Hillbillies at the Ansonia

In a release from Anson County Early College: Lights! Sound! Action! The curtain rose for Anson County Early College students as they presented their production of The Beverly Hillbillies on Friday, February 24 at the Ansonia Theatre in Wadesboro. This marked ACEC's first production at the Ansonia. For the past few months ACEC students and faculty were busily getting ready for the big event. ACEC students of all grades (9th to 12th and superseniors) were involved in some aspect of the play whether acting on stage, performing "fillers'

between scenes, constructing the sets and props, ushering guests or helping with backstage and technical needs.

The Beverly Hillbillies is ACEC's fourth theater production and first production at the Ansonia. In the past productions included The Pirates of the Caribbean (2006) and The Wizard of Oz (2008), and Alice in Wonderland (2010). The Early College initiative requires all Early College students to take part in a formal presentation outside of school. This year, as in the past, students addressed all aspects of interdisciplinary principles and 21st

Century skills (required by the New

Schools Project of North Carolina) throughout the process of this production. The Beverly Hillbillies is a large cast to begin with and with ACEC's style of performing plays, it became even bigger. To encourage maximum student involvement the three acts were divided by grade level: Act 1 for grades 9-10, Act 2 for grades 10-11 and Act 3 for grades 11, 12, and super-seniors, so there were three different Elly Mays, Jeds, Jethros, and four Grannys in the production. The students acting in the play practiced their public presentation skills as they memorized lines and projected their voices. Students performing during the "fillers" told humorous jokes, sang songs, and danced. Students also demonstrated additional aspects of interdisciplinary and 21st Century skills: artistic skills while designing and constructing the sets and props for the play as well as leadership, responsibility, and public communication skills while helping out backstage and ushering guests. ACEC faculty members have been extremely active throughout the production process with props and set construction, programs, tickets, bringing costumes and props, coordinating ushers, directing "fillers," and, of course, directing acts and scenes.

ACEC wishes to thank the Anson County Arts Council for their continued support for the arts and Anson New Tech Student Jesse Carpenter for his work on lights and sound during the production. ACEC faculty and students are very proud of the success of their production especially for the spectacular performance of the students! And know that all their hard
