Wadesboro Police Seize Over 50 **Pounds of Marijuana**

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The Wadesboro Police Department found almost fifty-five pounds of marijuana while conducting a routine traffic stop on Wednesday, March 26.

At approximately 8:35 a.m. Patrol Officer Tom Luckey noticed two vehicles traveling east on Highway 74 exceeding the posted speed limit. A Ford Crown Victoria and a Ford F-150 pickup truck appeared to be following closely together. Having probable cause, Officer Luckey made a traffic stop on the F-150. He noticed that the Crown Victoria left the scene, so he notified police dispatch. Sgt. Gordon Jackson immediately responded, stopping the Crown Victoria. After an initial investigation it was determined that the driver of the truck was also the owner of the automobile. Upon further investigation and a search of both vehicles, 54.8 pounds of marijuana was seized from the trunk of the Crown Victoria.

Three people were arrested. They are Ismael Zapata Ocana, 35, of Charlotte, Juan Carlos Wong Tadeo, 27, of Huntersville, NC, and Victor Perez Corneio, 24, of Rock Hill, SC. They were charged with Conspiracy to Traffic Marijuana, Trafficking Marijuana, Possession with Intent to Sell and Deliver Marijuana, and Felony Possession of Marijuana.

Wadesboro Town Council **Adopts Fire Codes**

During the March 3 meeting of the Wadesboro Town Council they readopted the International Fire Codes with North Carolina Amendments (NCFC). The NCFC provides for and requires different types of permits for businesses to operate in North Carolina. These permit classifications are broken down into the following three basic groups:

1) General Use Permit, a basic permit which is renewable in the following categories: One Year - includes assembly, high rise, instructional, educational and residential home care; Two Years - includes manufacturing; Three Years - includes most business types.

2) Special Operations Permit, includes such special operations as blasting, trade show/exhibitions, firework sales, etc.

3) Construction Permit, issued for the installation or modification of certain equipment such as fire alarms, sprinkler systems, hood ventilation systems. underground fuel storage tanks, etc.

The Wadesboro Fire Department will commence charging fees for inspections and permits for all current and new businesses beginning April 15, 2008. Payment will be required prior to a new business inspection being conducted and prior to the issuance of a new permit for current businesses.

The Wadesboro Fire Department would also like to remind businesses that it is a violation of the Fire Code and Town Ordinance to operate a business without the proper permit being obtained prior to operations.
