Wadesboro Man Found Murdered Inside His Work Truck

Destry Horne found shot in Columbus, NC. Three persons of interest arrested in Florida.

Polk County law enforcement officers are investigating the homicide of Destry Horne, 51, of Wadesboro that took place on the morning of Thursday, March 31 on a ramp at the intersection of Highways 74 and 108 in Columbus, NC. Horne was found deceased from a gunshot wound inside the box truck he had been driving. Officers had responded to a 6 a.m. call by the driver of a tractor trailer truck who had stopped on the same highway ramp to rest. That driver reported that a box truck had rolled back into his truck. The driver was unaware that Horne was deceased inside the box truck, and he is not considered to be involved with the homicide.

Upon investigation, the Polk County Sheriff's Office issued arrest warrants for two people, Quintae Dayrelle Edwards, 23, and Kayla Lynn Black, 18, both from the Spartanburg, SC area who were seen at the BP service station across the street from the homicide scene. The couple were wanted in Spartanburg County, SC for stealing a motor vehicle.

On Saturday, April 2 Spartanburg law enforcement officers were involved in a chase of a red Ford Mustage that was identified as the stolen car. Officers reported that the driver, identified as Edwards, reached speeds of over 130 miles per hour before abandoning the car and escaping on foot. Edwards was identified by fingerprints left in the car.

On Monday, April 4 Edwards, Black and another man, Kwame Fernanders, 22, were arrested in Tallahassee, Florida for breaking into an apartment, kidnapping and stealing a car in Gainesville, Florida the day before. They had tied the apartment occupants up with duct tape before ransacking the residence. The trio then stole a Hyundai car and took one of the apartment occupants to an ATM to get money. Upon returning to the apartment, they kidnapped a minor female victim, telling the other victims not to call police. They later released the female. Police were able to track a stolen iPhone in the trio's possession, leading officers to a hotel in Tallahassee where they made the arrests at 3:30 a.m.

The trio are being held in the Leon County Jail on several charges including kidnapping a minor for ransom, false imprisonment, home invasion with a firearm, grand theft auto and fugitive from justice.

Investigators from the Polk County Sheriff's Office were traveling to Gainesville to interview the trio about Horne's homicide.



Storytellers Bring Live Entertainment to the Ansonia April 15

The fifth annual Back Porch Stories, featuring nationally-known storyteller Mitch Capel, aka Gran'daddy Junebug, will be held at the Ansonia Theater at 7 p.m. on Friday, April 15. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$5.

Born and raised in Southern Pines, Capel has been delighting audiences throughout the United States since 1985. He calls his style of storytelling "sto'etry" (stories recited poetically). He has been featured at numerous festivals, including twice at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, TN and the Timpanogas Storytelling Festival in Orem, Utah, the Spoleto Festival in Charleston, SC, the 2009 Smithsonian's Folklife Festival on the National Mall in Washington, DC and annually at both the National Black Storytelling Festival (since 1988) and the Signifyin' & Testifyin' Storytelling Festival in Minnesota (since 1994).

Also appearing at the family-friendly event are Linda Goodman and Jadie Fuson. Goodman draws on her Appalachian roots to create a magic world where fantasy and ordinary heroes come together to entertain and inspire. She has performed nationwide and been published in the Chicken Soup and Stories for the Heart series. Her one-woman show and book Daughters of the Appalachians has also been performed as a play by theater companies in California, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Georgia and Virginia. Her CDs include Jessie and Other Stories and Bobby Pins, both winners of multiple Storytelling World Awards. Goodman has been a professional storyteller since January, 1989, and currently resides in Waxhaw, NC.

Fuson works with boys at Cameron Boys Camp where he has learned how to capture the attention of his audience. He is a lover of great stories, his first mentor being "the greatest storyteller of all time: Jesus." Listener beware, this teller may cause extreme bouts of laughter and visions of strange situations, and in severe cases, even a euphoric sense of community. Moderator is J. A. Bolton of Rockingham. Bolton writes a column for the Richmond County Daily Journal and recently won the Bold-Faced Liars' Showdown in Laurinburg.

Bolton said he finds telling stories a good way to take a break from hard work on the farm.
