2,433 Reported Cases of COVID-19 in Anson County

As of Monday, April 5 the Health Department posted that Anson County had 2,433 reported cases of COVID-19. 19 of those cases were active and 56 deaths.

Health Director Fred Thompson, PhD gave this update. Some important updates about operations at the Health Department and Covid vaccinations. Effective immediately, the Health Department is offering Covid vaccinations to all adults 18 and over. Anyone 18 or older can fill out the registration form and email it to: covidregistration@co.anson.nc.us or drop it off at the Health Department.

The county has set up a direct link to the registration form on the county government home page, www.co.anson.nc.us. You can also request the form via email at covidregistration@co.anson.nc.us or by calling the Health Department at 704-694-5188.

People who do not have an active email account can drop off the completed registration form in our drop box located at the front door of the Health Department, located at 110 Ashe Street in Wadesboro. Or they can call us at (704) 694-5188, press 1, and we will take their information over the phone.

Once we receive the registration form or have their information via the phone, we will contact the individual

While people 16 and 17 are also now eligible to get vaccinated, only the Pfizer vaccine is approved for the 16 and 17 year old age group. The Health Department does not offer the Pfizer vaccine. We vaccinate with the Moderna vaccine, which is authorized for adults 18 and over. Our local 16 and 17 year old young adults who wish to get vaccinated - which I recommend - can find a Pfizer vaccine site at the state's You Have a Spot Get Your Shot website (myspot.nc.gov) and schedule their vaccination at a Pfizer

Also, starting next Monday, April 12 the Health Department is reopening to our normal in-person clinical services on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. We will continue to offer the Moderna Covid vaccine at the EMS base on Country Club Road on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

We are making these changes as we have seen a significant decrease in the demand for the vaccine over the last few weeks, combined with the need to start seeing patients again at the Health Department. Also, there are many more vaccine sites opening up across the state, some of which will be offering the Johnson and Johnson single dose vaccine.

As always, please reach out to us with your questions. Finally, I want to encourage all eligible adults to get vaccinated. The vaccines are safe and effective, and they play a critical role in helping to finally put the pandemic behind us.' The NC Department of Health and Human Services

Burning Yard Debris During Spring Wildfire Season

In North Carolina, March through May is historically recognized as spring wildfire season, a period when conditions are more favorable for wildfire. As residents begin working in their yards, the N.C. Forest Service urges them to think before burning yard debris. "Every year, almost 40% of wildfires in North Carolina are the result of careless debris

burning," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "To protect ourselves and our forestland from wildfire, we have to be responsible and vigilant. Check the weather. Ma ke sure you're prepared to burn before you do. Never leave a debris fire unattended, and always have a water source and phone nearby in case you need them. There are many factors to consider before burning yard debris. The N.C. Forest Service

encourages residents to contact their local county forest ranger for technical advice and options to help ensure the safety of people, property and the forest. To find contact information for your local NCFS county ranger, visit www.ncforestservice.gov/contacts. The N.C. Forest Service offers the following tips to protect property and

- prevent wildfires: · Consider alternatives to burning. Some types of debris, such as leaves, grass and
- Check local burning laws. Some communities allow burning only during specified hours Others forbid it entirely. Make sure you have a valid permit. You can obtain a burn permit at any open
- authorized permitting agent or online at www.ncforestservice.gov/burnpermit. Local fire officials can recommend a safe way to burn debris. Don't pile vegetation on
- the ground. Instead, place it in a cleared area and contain it in a screened receptacle away from overhead branches and wires. Keep your pile small, not tall. • Stay informed about the weather and possible weather changes. Postpone outdoor
- burning during high winds or gusts, or periods of low relative humidity. Even if you have a valid permit, stop burning if strong winds develop. ullet Be sure you are fully prepared before burning. To control the fire, you will need a hose bucket, steel rake and a shovel for tossing dirt on the fire. Keep a phone nearby, too.
- Never use kerosene, gasoline, diesel fuel or other flammable liquids to speed up debris burning.
