Over Two Million Dollars Awarded to Anson County Schools!

Anson County Schools has been named one of only 24 national recipients of the competitive and coveted Youth Career-Connect Grant. Only 18 states received awards, and Anson County was the only grant recipient in North Carolina. The school system will receive up to \$2,247,373 over a four year period, beginning with the upcoming 2014-15 school year.

Anson County Schools Superintendent Mr. Michael Freeman said, "This is the result of a wonderfully talented

able to collaborate with my staff to develop a plan which aligns with President Obama's high school redesign initiative. I felt that Anson County encompassed all the criteria needed to qualify and we did." Chad Murphy, Anson High School Principal, along with several staff members were also among the "movers and shakers" surrounding this collaborative effort.

This grant funding will enable Anson County Schools to initiate a "Career-Connect: STEM Academy" at Anson High School, the only comprehensive high school in the district. The Anson High School program will provide opportunity for participating students to focus their high school studies in four highly skilled and in-demand career areas: 1) Advanced Manufacturing, 2) Pre-Engineering, 3) Information Tech-nologies, and 4) Pre-Med and Biomedical Sciences. In the first year there will be only 20 student seats available in each career area for a total of 80 freshmen in the program. Then, each subsequent year, an additional 80 entering freshmen will be added, for a total of 320 students at the end of four years.

The Youth CareerConnect Grant is a part of President Obama's major High School Redesign Initiative. The intent is to help students develop knowledge and skills in high school that will prepare them to successfully complete a college degree or immediately enter the workforce after graduation. To accomplish this, the Anson High plan is to provide an innovative setting for students who have an idea that they will become engineers, doctors or nurses, computer specialists, web designers, plant or medical lab technicians, or dozens of other potential careers in the four STEM areas. Career-Connect students will be immersed in a career-based environment that emphasizes real world learning, problem solving, and teaming. They will also make connections to business partners. work briefly in the career industry, and earn college credits that result in a credential that leads to a college degree or employment. Students will have the opportunity to graduate from high school with at least 18 hours of community college credit and one or more certificates recognized nationally by business and industry.

Five excellent business partners have helped design the Anson program, and they will actively participate in helping students and teachers foster success in the realworld career areas. Those partners are South Piedmont Community College, Anson County Chamber of Commerce, Carolinas Healthcare System, Columbus McKinnon, Hornwood, and Schaeffler USA.

Superintendent Freeman expressed great anticipation for the impact this grant-funded program will have. "This is an important step in our vision for high school education in Anson County," said Freeman. "We are truly excited about the opportunities this funding and design will open up for our students. We anticipate that our graduates will be in demand after graduation, fully ready to continue studying in college or enter the workplace, with national

credentials that make them highly marketable.'

Carolina Farm Credit to Issue Patronage Checks

Grant Provides Foreclosure Prevention Offers Help for Homeowners Statewide

The North Carolina Housing Finance Agency has been awarded a \$2 million grant that will enable an additional 8,000 households statewide to receive foreclosure prevention counseling. The \$2,009,013 award, from Neighbor $\!$ America under the National Foreclosure Mitigation Counseling (NFMC) Program, is the second-highest award nationwide, and the eighth NFMC award won by the North Carolina agency. So far, NFMC grants have enabled the Agency to pay for foreclosure prevention counseling

services for more than 40,000 homeowners in North Carolina. The assistance is available statewide through 28 HUD-approved counseling agencies, and is provided to homeowners Also available to homeowners at no cost is the N.C. Foreclosure Prevention Fund, which

makes mortgage payments for up to 36 months for qualified unemployed homeowners while they look for a job or retrain. Nearly 16,000 North Carolinians have received assistance so far. The N.C. Housing Finance Agency received funding for this effort from the U.S. Dept. of the Treasury because of North Carolina's high unemployment during the recession.
