They all have two things in common. They care about people and they enjoy being the lifeline of society - that steady voice in the storm. Those of you who have scanners understand what this means.

Sheriff Allen said that after taking over the 911 Operations Center in 2008, he has grown to understand this more than ever. "I will say without hesitation that Anson County now has the most qualified, most dedicated and highly trained dispatchers. I would put our operation up against any 911 Center anywhere. I want to again personally thank my 911 Director Holly Mullis and her staff for the outstanding job they continue to do day in and day out, 365 days a year.

As you go about your daily routine remember: should you find yourself in any kind of emergency situation you can dial 911 and be confident a professional Telecommunicator will answer your call and talk you through your emergency, staying on the line with you as long as necessary and have help on the way at the same time," Allen said.

Report from Raleigh

In a release from Rep. Mark Brody: Representative Mark Brody joined colleagues in the North Carolina House this week in working toward improving education in North Carolina. Rep. Brody co-sponsored House Bill 146, titled "Back to Basics," which unanimously passed the full House. The measure amends current education statutes by requiring that North Carolina public instruction curriculums include cursive writing and memorizing multiplication tables. While they remain optional, many schools have dropped these lessons from their curriculum following the implementation of Common Core. The measure would incorporate cursive and multiplication tables back into the curriculum starting in the 2013-2014 school year.

Rep. Brody says, "Back to Basics will provide students with a basic foundation to build their knowledge and communication skills while still incorporating new teaching techniques and the latest technology."

A joint session also confirmed Governor McCrory's nominees to the Board of Education: Rebecca H. Taylor (Pitt County), Dr. Olivia Oxendine (Robeson County), A.L. "Buddy" Collins (Forsyth County), Gregory Alcorn (Rowan County), William Cobey Jr. (Orange County), Marcella Ramirez Savage (Union County). These newest members of the Board of Education will be tasked with helping to fulfill the Governor's and General Assembly's vision of a North Carolina school system that ensures student safety and prepares them for a bright future.

House Bill 435 also passed the House and sets out a formula for assigning a letter grade to North Carolina K-12 schools each year. For elementary and middle schools, the formula uses grade 3-8 student performance and improvement in mathematics and reading. high schools, the letter grade is determined by a formula that assesses student performance in Algebra, English and Biology, but also uses college or workplace readiness as a factor.

The measures are part of a General Assembly effort this session to improve education with accountability, increased efficiency and improved access to technology
