Upon arrival in Raleigh the students were able to visit both the NC Museum of Natural Science and the NC Museum of History. After visiting the museums the group went to the Legislative Building. North Carolina's legislature convenes its long session in January and usually stays in session until August in oddnumbered years. Legislators return to Raleigh for a short session in May of the following even-numbered year and typically are in

session for about three months. The short session allows legislators to review and adjust the state's two-year budget that was adopted the previous year. During the short session lawmakers may only consider new legislation that impacts the budget or bills that passed the "house of origin" in the previous year. Because the legislature is currently in short

session, students received a guided tour but were unable to meet any Representatives. ACEC also enjoyed a tour of the Capital Building where they had the opportunity to learn about the building's history. One of the favorite stories was hearing about how Union soldiers rode their horses up and down the stairs. Eukela Little's favorite aspect of the Capital Building was seeing the original Senate and Representative rooms. The Lieutenant Governor's area was especially fascinating. "Overall, I feel that the entire trip was very informative and interesting," said Eukela. Mili Nguyen really appreciated the Capital building as well, and she said, "Learning the government process while on site made it more real and easier to understand."



AES Holds Science Night

Recently Ansonville Elementary School held Science Night for all students, parents and family members. Over 50% of AES students in grades kindergarten through six were actively involved in this amazing learning experience.

- Students in kindergarten & first grade demonstrated their knowledge of the physical properties of eggs. Each team received twenty four eggs (19 boiled and 5 raw). By examining the physical properties of the eggs (and without breaking them), the students tried to select the five raw eggs. Once each team had selected their eggs they tested them by breaking them over a teacher's head!
