Faulkner's Texaco Service

This one really goes back - in fact checked under the hood, changed oil, greased I lettered this Ford pickup on June 21, 1957 - complete with the Texaco logo. You will note this was soon after Wadesboro began the telephone dial system, the North Carolina Telephone Co. (Dial MY4-3517).

This service station was on the corner of Washington Street and Highway 52/74 and was a new station - Bruce Faulkner opened it in 1957. His brother Bob Faulkner had the Rambler dealership along with Pontiac, also. Bruce was head of the service department where he spent his days. In the evenings, he pumped gas,

cars - "the service station bit.

In 1961, Bob Faulkner, his wife Chris, sister Ruth Davis and her husband Mack Davis all went to New York City. Leaving there, they came by Atlantic City, New Jersey to see the new Rambler being displayed in dealers.

Back home and after the death of Bro Bob, Bruce closed this station and opened a "tune-up shop" where he worked until his death in 1966 - and now there are other changes - no Texaco station on that corner, no Rambler dealers and so many have gone on.

4-H Livestock Club Meets April 23rd

On Tuesday, April 23 at 6:30 p.m. the Anson County 4-H Livestock Club will have it's regular monthly meeting. This club is open to youth ages 3-19, although they must be 5 vears old to officially be 4-H members.

At the meeting they will discuss the opportunities and activities youth will do throughout the year including various projects, presentations, and farm visits. Youth do not have to own animals to be involved with the club, though they must have an interest in learning about livestock and agriculture.

4-H is the nation's premiere youth organization with over 7 million members nationally. 4-H fosters leadership and life skill development through their motto "Learning by Doing," which requires members to work in a hands-on environment.

State Championship Scheduled for Youth Hunter Education Skills Tournament

The NC Wildlife Resources Commission will host the 35th annual Youth Hunter Education Skills Tournament - the state championship for pre-collegiate shooting sports - on April 27 at the Millstone 4-H Center near Ellerbe in Richmond County. Teams and individuals will compete in rifle, shotgun and archery marksmanship, map-and-compass orienteering, and a written wildlife knowledge test.

Competition is conducted on senior (high school) and junior (middle and elementary schools) divisional levels, with overall team and overall individual awards based on aggregate scores in all events. Teams are organized within public and private schools. Home-schooled students and teams representing 4-H or FFA also can compete, provided they meet eligibility requirements.

'Besides outstanding competition, this event is such a showcase for youth and their involvement in conservation." said Travis Casper, the state hunter education coordinator. "Between the participants and spectators, there is typically upwards of 3,000 people in attendance from every corner of the state.'

The Wildlife Commission conducted nine regional competitions in March, with hundreds of middle school and high school students participating, and 54 teams advancing to the state championship. The championship represents an opportunity for competitors who advanced from district events to showcase outdoor skills learned through the Commission's Hunter Education Program. The competition requires a demonstration of skills taught in free hunter education classes. While competing in the tournament is for students 18 years and younger, the Wildlife Commission offers free hunter education courses and advanced hunter education on a regular schedule for all ages.
