 Tip 1 - Get more physical activity. Research shows that both aerobic exercise and resistance training can help control diabetes, but the greatest benefit comes from a fitness program that includes both.

 Tip 2 - Get plenty of fiber. Reduce your risk of diabetes and improve your blood sugar control by eating foods rich in fiber which include fruits, vegetables, beans, whole grains, nuts and seeds. Tip 3 - Go for whole grains. Whole grains may reduce your risk of diabetes and help main-

tain blood sugar levels. Many foods from whole grains come ready to eat, including various breads, pasta products and many cereals. Look for the word "whole" on the package and among the first few items on the ingredient list. Tip 4 - Lose extra weight. Diabetes prevention may hinge on weight loss. Overweight

adults reduced their diabetes risk by 16% for every 2.2 pounds of weight loss. Those who lost 5% to 10% and exercised regularly reduced their risk by almost 60% over three years. Tip 5 - Skip fad diets and make healthier choices. Excluding or strictly limiting a particular food group may cause you to give up essential nutrients. Instead, think variety and portion control as part of an overall healthy-eating plan.
