Anson County's Unemployment Rate at 6.2% in December

The lastest information for unemployment rates from the Employment Security Commission are for December 2015. In December the unemployment rate in Anson County was 6.2%. Statewide the unemployment rate for December was 5,3 percent.

Anson's total labor force in December was 10,828. Of that number 10,162 were employed and 666 were unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 70 of North Carolina's counties in December, increased in 21, and remained unchanged in nine. Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 12.0 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.9 percent.

Thirteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases while one increased and one remained unchanged. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 7.3 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the

lowest rate at 4.2 percent. The December not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 5.3 percent. When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates increased in 81 counties, decreased in 12, and remained unchanged in seven. Four

teen metro areas experienced rate increases over the year while one decreased. The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in December by 25,147 to 4,502,869 while those unemployed decreased 10,375 to 249,845. Since December 2014, the number of workers employed statewide increased 140,526, while those unemployed increased 18,167.
