Anson's March Unemployment Rate Down Again to 7.3%

In our April 16, 2014, edition The Express reported that the 7.5% unemployment rate for Anson County during February was measured at the lowest number since April 2008's 7%. In March the rate dropped slightly lower to 7.5%. That marks the seventh straight month of single digit unemployment rates for Anson. Statewide the unemployment rate for March was 6.6%.

In March 2013 the rate in Anson County was 10.4%.

while those unemployed decreased 86,425.

Anson's total labor force in March was 10,495. Of that number 9,724 were employed and 771 were unemployed. In February the total labor force was $10,\!413,$ with $9,\!632$ employed and 781 unemployed.

In real numbers, Anson County gained 10 jobs in March compared to February.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 23 of North Carolina's counties in March, decreased in 59 and remained the same in 18. Three of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases, while five saw decreases and six remained unchanged.

Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 12.7 percent, while Chatham County had the lowest at 4.6 percent. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 9.4 percent experienced the highest rate and Durham-Chapel Hill at 5.1 percent had the lowest. The March not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 6.6 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 14 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year. The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in March by 47,707 to 4,355,340, while those unemployed decreased 210 to 306,429. Since March 2013, the number of workers employed statewide increased 68,328,

NC Pre-K classes operate on a regular school calendar and are designed to address emotional and social development, physical health, language development, and cognitive functioning. Teachers are highly qualified and hold a minimum of a BA/BS degree as well as specific early childhood credentials. Through incorporation of indoor and outdoor learning environments, students participate in active learning experiences to foster a lifetime love of education.
