## **Anson Unemployment Rate Was 11% for March**

Anson County's unemployment rate in March was 11%, barely changed from February's 11.2% rate. Statewide the unemployment rate for March was 9.6%, February's rate was 10.1%. Looking back at March 2011, the rate then for Anson County was 12.2%.

Anson's total labor force in March was 10,874. Of that number 9,682 were employed and 1,192 were unemployed. In February the total labor force was 10,862, with 9,648 employed and 1,214 unemployed.

Unemployment rates fell in 98 of North Carolina's 100 counties in March, increased in the remaining two counties. Unemployment rates declined in 85 counties, increased in 14 and, remained the same in one when compared to the same month last year.

"Unemployment rates were down in nearly every county in March," said N.C. Department

of Commerce Deputy Secretary Dale Carroll. "Over-the-year numbers show a positive downward trend as we continue to focus on supporting employees by growing jobs in North Carolina. We offer job search assistance, resume writing and many other programs at our employment service offices statewide for citizens in the job market."

North Carolina had 35 counties that were at or below the state's seasonally unadjusted

unemployment rate of 9.6 percent. Unemployment rates decreased in all 14 Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Statewide the number of workers employed (not seasonally adjusted) increased in March by

14,122 to 4,197,446, and those unemployed decreased 26,890 to 444,977. Since March 2011, the number unemployed decreased 34,823 and the number employed increased 44,443. Orange County had the state's lowest unemployment rate in March at 6.0 percent. Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 18.5 percent.

## **State Unemployment Extension Program Set to Expire**

Based on recent notification from USDOL, North Carolina is no longer eligible for the Extended Benefits (EB) program. The last payable week of EB will be the week ending May 12, 2012. Workers who file their claim through the EB program will no longer be eligible to receive extended benefits once the period ends. Roughly 199,000 people are receiving benefits in North Carolina. Of those, 17,000 people are currently receiving benefits in the EB program. DES is working quickly to notify those who are potentially affected by this program ending. Claimants currently in the extended benefits program will be notified by mail.

In February, Congress reauthorized 100-percent federal funding for Extended Benefits and a provision allowing states to adopt "three-year look-back" triggers through the end of 2012. With the exception of Alaska, states offering EB have enacted what is known as an "alternative total unemployment rate trigger," which requires states to have an unemployment rate of at least 6.5 percent and a current three-month average unemployment rate that is at least 10 percent greater than it was during the same three-month period in any of the previous three years (the "three-year look-back"). The estimated last payable week is when states will fail to meet the three-year look-back requirement based on each state's current three-month average unemployment rate.

The EB program is operated by the State of North Carolina pursuant to state law, federal law, and U.S. Department of Labor (USDOL) policy. The EB program is subject to labor market conditions in each state.

### **Details from Board of Education Meeting**

The Anson County Board of Education met on Monday, April 30. Here are some details from the meeting:

Change in May Board of Education meeting date A change in the May Board of Education business meeting date was approved. The May meeting will take place on Tuesday May 29th at the regularly scheduled meeting time.

Local Budget The BOE approved administration's

Local Budget The BOE approved administration's recommended local spending plan. The BOE approved Local budget will now go to the County Commissioners as a request for funding. The AC Commissioners will now review and take action on appropriations for the school system. The budget request is a "maintenance of effort" budget seeking to fund the schools at the current level. It does not call for any increases in revenue from the county.

**Personnel** The process for filling the Lilesville Elementary School Principal position was announced. First round interviews will take place the week of May 7th with school, parent, and community participation the following week.

In a like manner, the process for filling the Ansonville

Elementary Principal position will begin the week of May 7th. School, parent, and community participation will be the following week (week beginning the 14th of May).

In other personnel news, administration will begin interviewing for the Assistant Superintendent: Curriculum and Instruction the week of May 21st.

Ms. Mary Ratliff Appointed Ms. Mary Ratliff, Interim Principal at Lilesville, was recommended and appointed to the Administrator: Student and Administrative Services position beginning July 1, 2012. Superintendent Greg Firn said, "I am very pleased to welcome Ms. Ratliff to the central office leadership team. Ms. Ratliff brings, to this leadership position, building administrative experience at both the high school and elementary school level as well as an accomplished teaching background in Career Technical Education (CTE). She will work closely with Mr. McLeod in transition over the next two months in preparation for assuming full leadership responsibilities in July."

**Board passes Resolution** The Board unanimously approved a resolution requesting that the Legislature of the State of North Carolina eliminate discretionary reversions for the betterment of public education for all school systems in North Carolina. The elimination of the reversions will allow Anson County Schools to offset the loss of federal Edujob funds at the end of this fiscal year, and would put an end to discretionary reversions in North Carolina.

**Board approves Meal Prices for SY 2012-2013** The Board of Education approved an increase in the price of a full paid student lunch meal by 5¢ and an increase in the paid breakfast price by 15¢. The increase is due to the reauthorization of the Child Nutrition Program by Congress, Section 205 "Equity in School Lunch Pricing," which requires LEA's to start gradually increasing the price of a full paid student

meal to match the reimbursement rate for a free student meal. **AIG Program Change Proposed** Ms. Georgia Maner, Administrator: AIG, Assessment and Instructional Technology presented a "concept" plan for changes in Academically and Intellectually Gifted programming at the elementary level. The plan will be posted later this week.

In other news Anson County Schools will relinquish responsibility for Pre-Kindergarten programming to the Union County Community Action (Headstart). Anson County Schools will continue as a partner with UCCA and the Anson County Partnership for Children in efforts to provide the highest quality early childhood learning experience for Anson County children.

This move was precipitated in part by changes in Title I.

This move was precipitated, in part by changes in Title I funding requirements that required schools systems that use Title I funds to operate PreK services as "centers" rather than school specific programs. This requirement would result in countywide registration and the most needy students being placed irrespective of their residents.

Currently, Anson's two Pre-K programs (Ansonville, Morven)

significantly use Title I funds. The change in service providers will increase Title funds at both schools. These funds will be used to better meet the needs of K-6 students at each school.

Mr. Michael Freeman, Deputy Superintendent,

communicated that no staff will be displaced as a result of this change. Mr. Freeman will work with PreK staff on placement for next year.
