Inmate Escaped April 27, Captured Within Twelve Hour Period

An inmate at Brown Creek Correctional Institution in Polkton escaped from the minimum security prison just after midnight on Wednesday, April 27. Devin Brown, 22, was captured shortly after 12 noon that same day in a wooded area in Landis, NC (Rowan County) by Department of Public Safety officers with K-9 dogs.

Brown was serving a five year term for habitual impaired driving offenses. His release was scheduled for March 2019. No information was released on how Brown escaped the prison.

Anson County's Unemployment Rate at 6.1 Percent in March

Anson County's unemployment rate for March was 6.1 percent. In February the rate was 6.4 percent, and in January the rate was 6.5 percent. Statewide the unemployment rate for March was 5.4 percent.

Anson's total labor force in March was 11,052. Of that number 10,380 were employed and 672 were unemployed. In February the total labor force was 10,849, with 10,153 employed and 696 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in all 100 of North Carolina's counties in March. Hyde County had the highest unemployment rate at 13.3 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 4.2 percent. All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 7.6 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 4.4 percent. The March not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 5.4 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 84 counties, increased in 10, and remained unchanged in six. Twelve metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year while one increased and two remained unchanged.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in March by 72,136 to 4,613,997 while those unemployed decreased 14,105 to 262,210. Since March 2015, the number of workers employed statewide increased 141,151, while those unemployed decreased 4,447.
