Know the Warning Signs and Symptoms of Stroke

Make sure you can spot the symptoms in yourself and a loved one

Remember F.A.S.T. for signs of a stroke

Strokes are one of the top three causes of death in the United States and the leading cause of long-term disability. What's more, North Carolina is located in what researchers call the stroke belt, meaning the death rates for stroke are highest in this area compared to the rest of the United States.

While most stroke cases are unpredictable, identifying warning signs as soon as possible can make a big difference in how someone is treated for and recovers from a stroke.

Symptoms can include weakness on one side of the body, numbness, confusion, fatigue, dizziness, blurred vision, a severe headache and potentially paralysis. However, each stroke case has its own unique combination of signs and symptoms, so not everyone will experience all of them simultaneously nor at the same level of intensity.

F.A.S.T is an easy way to remember the signs of stroke. If you spot these signs in yourself or a loved one, you should call 911 immediately. • Face Drooping: Does one side of the face droop, or is it

numb? Ask the person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven? • Arm Weakness: Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

• Speech Difficulty: Is speech slurred? Is the person to unable to speak or hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "The sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

• Time to call 911: If someone shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 9-1-1 and get the person to the hospital immediately. Check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared.

Some lifestyle choices and medical conditions can put you at a higher risk of stroke. Some examples include:

- Poor nutrition
- Lack of physical activity Smoking
- High stress
- High blood pressure

By making an effort every day to move more, eat more fruits and vegetables, get more sleep, quit smoking and regularly checking your blood pressure, you can cut down

Wildfires Are a No-Drone **Zone for Good Reason**

There were two drone incursions Friday, May 2 over the Sunset Road Fire, an active wildfire burning in Brunswick County, NC. While these drones were in the air firefighting aircraft had to be grounded for 45 minutes. When wildfire runs and spreads rapidly, every minute counts.


Flying a drone near or over a wildfire is ILLEGAL. Don't do it.

Firefighting aircraft that respond to wildfires fly low in support of ground personnel. Drones can pose a serious threat to pilot and public safety. A drone that disrupts air operations also puts firefighters, residents and property a risk of loss to wildfire.

Oftentimes, media outlets, other first responders and private landowners deploy drones near or over wildfires

It isn't ok. It's dangerous ... until it's deadly. Don't do it. It's illegal to fly a drone near or over a wildfire in North Carolina. N.C.G.S. §15A-300.4 -- No person, entity, or State agency shall use an unmanned aircraft system within either a horizontal distance of 3,000 feet or a vertical distance of 3,000 feet from any forest fire within

the jurisdiction of the N.C. Forest Service. Remember, wildfires are a no-drone zone for good reason.
