Pressure Canner Dial Gauge Testing

It is that time of year again. Gardens will be coming off and people will start pulling out their canners to put up vegetables. Pressure canning is a must for all low acid foods. This includes all vegetables, meats, poultry, seafood and soups or a combination of any of these items.

Make sure your steam dial gauge is correct. The Anson Cooperative Extension Center is offering Pressure Canner Dial Gauge testing for steam dial gauge lids only. Weighted gauges do not require testing.


The Extension Center will offer free testing beginning on Monday, May 20. This service will be provided throughout the season, ending late summer, July 31. Simply bring your canner lid, or just the gauge, to the Extension Center at 501 McLaurin Street and drop it off. Gauges will be checked, and you will receive a call when it is ready to be picked up. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. Canning publications and information are also available.
