Sen. McLaurin Comments on Fracking

'With fracking, clean drinking water should be top priority."

Senator Gene McLaurin voted No on Senate Bill 786 last week. It is a bill to lift the moratorium on hydraulic fracturing in NC. In effect, the bill lifts the moratorium before the state legislature reviews and adopts rules and regulations. Senator McLaurin tried to amend the bill to allow local cities and counties to weigh in on land use planning, transportation needs, and public health issues, but the amendment failed 16-30. Senator McLaurin who represents Anson, Scotland, Stanly, Richmond, and part of Rowan Counties has heard from many citizens across the district. One common theme has been - 'If we are going to proceed with hydraulic fracturing in NC, then take your time, and get this right.

Anson County Commissioners passed a local resolution in 2013 implementing a moratorium on hydraulic fracturing for the next five years. This bill prohibits local governments from banning or restricting fracking, thus limiting their ability to protect residents from the impacts of fracking in any way. Senator McLaurin said, "We should be reaching out to our local communities to determine their needs and concerns, to determine the unique impact on that particular community. Instead, this bill prohibits their input.

He went on to say, "Property rights are not adequately addressed. Under this bill, companies can extract natural gas from your land if a majority of your neighbors approve it.

Senator McLaurin said, "Our work is not done. Without knowing what these rules will look like, I could not support the bill. We have the opportunity to put the right safeguards in place – to protect the public, our drinking water, our landowners, and to be good stewards of the earth. The bottom line is that I want my grandchildren to grow up with clean drinking water. I want that for everyone in NC. I've spent my entire career in the energy industry and I believe that hydraulic fracturing can help create jobs and move us towards energy independence. But I'm not willing to risk our drinking water or move forward irresponsibly until proper safeguards are put in place.
