Third grade students from Wadesboro Primary School, along with their teachers and their Principal, Mrs. Betsy Ammons, will arrive at Wadesboro Elementary School at 10 a.m. and will meet the administration and staff in the WES gymnasium. During this



assembly students will hear WES Principal Mr. Owens discuss what fourth grade life is like and what the expectations will be for these future WES students. Students will have an opportunity to meet the fourth grade teachers, and the event will conclude with a tour of Wadesboro Elementary School.

Driver Education Information

The Driver Education program will be offering eight classes this summer to provide the 30 hours classroom instruction for driver education students. Each class will be for eight days, four hours per day. There will be a break scheduled each day. Students will be allowed to bring snacks from home and vending machines will be available. Driver's Education will offer behind-the-wheel



training during the school year. The program is offering these eight classes in hopes of accommodating the summer schedule for all rising 9th graders. All ninth graders are encouraged to attend and will need to pick a class that fits their summer

schedule, attend all eight days and pass the exams associated with the class.

Ninth graders who do not turn 14 1/2 years old until later in the school year will also need to take the Driver's Education classroom portion this summer. The behind-thewheel training for these students will then be postponed until they reach the legal age for behind-the-wheel training of $14 \ 1/2$ years old. The program schedule is designed to prevent it from interfering with student schedules during the school year. By offering these classes during the summer students will not have to choose between athletics, after school tutoring, homework and Driver's Education. Also, by having the classes in the summer, students can focus their time and energy on becoming a knowledgeable and safe motorist. Transportation services will not be provided. Students will need to make their own transportation arrangements for getting to class and home. The classes will start at 8 a.m. and end at 12 p.m. or 1 to 5 p.m. daily. Students may be dropped off no earlier than 7:40 a.m. and picked up no later than 12:05 p.m. The drop off and pick up point will be the Anson High School Campus bus parking lot.
