BBB Warns Parents about College Aid Schemes

Over the next few weeks, thousands of seniors will graduate and begin the transition from high school to college. Many families struggle with how to pay for college and they seek financial aid to help defer the costs. There are many sources of financial aid with different qualifications that can be both confusing and overwhelming for parents. Sources include the college or university that your child plans to attend as well as federal and private lenders. The Better Business Bureau warns you to

carefully screen private companies that offer loans and other forms of financial assistance for your child's education. These companies often use direct mail marketing, telemarketing, television, radio, and online advertising to promote their products.

"Parents who need financial aid for their college-bound students in the form of grants, loans and scholarships may ignore deceptive business practices that some private lenders use," said BBB President Tom Bartholomy.

The BBB has advice for how you can spot the red flags that could lead to financial losses instead of financial aid. Red flags:

- · Payment of an advance fee to get a grant, loan or scholarship.
- Payment of the fee in cash or by wire transfer only. These types of payments do not leave a paper trail.
- Guaranteed promise that you will get the grant, loan or scholarship. • Phone numbers or fax numbers outside
- of the United States. Request for social security numbers and credit card numbers of parents and student to qualify you for the financial aid.
- BBB advice: Apply for financial aid directly through the college or university where your child will be going.
- · Apply for assistance through federal financial aid programs.
- Research prospective private lenders before providing personal information about you or your child.

Writer's Club to Present Bathanti Documentary

Bathanti, a documentary about North Carolina's Poet Laureate Joseph Bathanti, will be shown in the Hampton B. Allen Library's Little Theatre at 10 a.m. on Monday, June 24. The program is co-sponsored by the Anson County Writers' Club (ACWC) and the library. Admission is free.

An award-winning author of poetry, short stories, novels and essays, Bathanti was a visiting artist serving Anson and other NC counties from 1985 to 1989. Much of the documentary was filmed in Anson County and shows familiar scenes such as the Hub Restaurant, where he could be found working on his latest writing. A book of poems, Anson County, is the result of the artist's time spent here.

Interviews with Bathanti are blended with insights of other writers such as Michael Parker and Robert Morgan. Location footage, photos, archival film and text are used to interpret readings from Bathanti's work.

"Joseph Bathanti created a wonderful, radiant and reverent memoir of his time spent here in Anson County as visiting artist," said Beverley Getzen, ACWC President. "His book Anson County garnered praise for him and brought joy to the hearts of Ansonians who had the chance to get to know him during his stay here. He is a great story lover and storyteller, able to capture the feelings of people for the places in which they live. This film will bring back warm memories to those who knew him and gain him a host of new fans once they see this sensitive documentary."

Bathanti's other books of poetry include The Feast of All Saints and This Metal. East Liberty and Coventry are acclaimed novels, and The High Heart is a collection of his short stories. The writer has received numerous awards including the Sam Ragan Fine Arts Award, the Sherwood Anderson Award and the Novello Literary Award.
