Anson County's Unemployment Rate Dropped to 5.9% in April

Anson County's unemployment rate for April was 5.9 percent. In March the rate was 6.1 percent. Statewide the unemployment rate for April was 5.2 percent.

Anson's total labor force in April was 11,009. Of that number $10{,}356$ were employed and 653 were unemployed. In March the total labor force was 11,027, with 10,358 employed and 669 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 89 of North Carolina's counties in April, increased in six counties, and remained unchanged in five counties.

Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 12.8 percent while Orange and Buncombe Counties both had the lowest at 3.9 percent. Thirteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases while one increased and one remained unchanged. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 7.9 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 4.1 percent. The April not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 5.2 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in 95 counties, increased in one, and remained unchanged in four. All 15 metro areas experienced

rate decreases over the year.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in April by 43,054 to 4,492,858, while those unemployed decreased 8,095 to 247,392. Since April 2014, the number of workers employed statewide increased 113,452, while those unemployed decreased 24,382.

State Fire Marshal Announces Anson County Volunteer Fire Department Grants

Ansonville VFD, Burnsville Fire and Rescue Ambulence Service, Gulledge VFD, Lilesville Fire Department and Peachland Fire Department were all awarded grants recently. They were among 574 volunteer fire departments across the state to receive the grants.

In a recent release Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal Wayne Goodwin said he was pleased to announce the recipients of the 2015 Volunteer Fire Department Fund grants. This year, more than \$9.5 million was awarded to 574 volunteer fire departments across the state.

The Volunteer Fire Department Fund, administered by the North Carolina Office of State Fire Marshal, was created by the General Assembly in 1988 to provide dollar matching grants to assist volunteer fire departments with the purchase of equipment and capital expenditures. The maximum annual award amount is \$30,000 per applicant.

T'm proud that so many fire departments are taking advantage of this important grant program. These grants help our volunteer fire departments stretch their budgets to better serve their communities," said Goodwin.

The recipient departments will match the grant on a dollar-for-dollar basis unless the department receives less than \$50,000 per year from municipal and county funding, in which case the recipient will match one dollar for every three dollars of grant funds up to \$30,000.

More than \$110 million in matching grant funds has been awarded to volunteer fire departments since the program began in 1988.

The specific awards for the Anson County fire departments were: Ansonville VFD \$12,975; Burnsville Fire and Rescue \$28,656; Gulledge VFD \$8,319; Lilesville Fire Department \$21,000; and Peachland Fire Department \$30,000.
