### **COVID-19 Funds Disbursed** to Counties for Public Health and Essential Services

Anson County receives \$647,744

On May 26 Governor Roy Cooper announced that \$85.4 million in federal funds provided for COVID-19 relief to counties will be disbursed this week. Three large counties, Guilford, Mecklenburg and Wake, have already received funds directly from the federal government, and 59 other counties that have completed certification will receive funds this week from the state-administered Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) that was passed by Congress. Counties are encouraged to support municipalities with the funding as needed.

"Everyone is working hard to make ends meet, including county governments as they finalize their budgets," Governor Cooper said. "These funds will help communities respond to the COVID-19 crisis with testing, personal

protective equipment and more."

Though the federal government did not require that the state share any of the \$3.56 billion in the CRF to North Carolina local governments, Governor Cooper's COVID-19 budget proposal recommended \$300 million be allocated to counties and municipalities. Ultimately, the unanimously approved and bipartisan budget that Governor Cooper signed included \$150 million for counties which have the flexibility to share monies with their municipalities as county commissioners deem appropriate. The full distribution of funds is listed at www.nc.gov/agencies/ncpro by county, along with instructions to counties about how the funds may be used.

The CRF funds may be used for medical needs including the COVID-19 related expenses of public hospitals and clinics, including testing; public health expenses, such as personal protective equipment and other medical supplies, as well as the cost of cleaning public areas and facilities such as nursing homes; payroll expenses for public safety or healthcare employees dedicated to responding to the COVID-19 emergency; and expenses to comply with public health measures, including teleworking, distance learning, food delivery, paid leave for public employees, expenses for maintaining prisons, and protecting the homeless population.

By state law, the 97 remaining counties will receive a base amount of \$250,000, with more distributed by population. This quick disbursement of funds was coordinated by the state Office of State Budget and Management and the new North Carolina Pandemic Recovery Office (NC PRO).

NC PRO is a temporary office that coordinates and

oversees funds made available through federal and state COVID-19 recovery legislation, including the CRF. The office offers technical assistance for entities which receive funds and ensures proper reporting and accounting of all funds. The office will also work on the state's economic recovery and strategic plan as North Carolina rebuilds from this pandemic. Two staff members will help lead the office's recovery efforts: Stephanie McGarrah will serve as Executive Director of

Dwavne Patterson will serve as the Deputy Director/Chief Operating Officer for NCPRO.

## What is the Census? Here's Information about How Important the Census is for Everyone.

Once a decade, America comes together to participate in the decennial census, creating national awareness of the census and statistics. This census provides the basis for reapportioning Congressional seats, redistricting, and distributing billions of dollars in federal funding to support your state, county, and community's vital programs.

The Census Bureau collects information through the decennial census, the American Community Survey, the economic census, and many other surveys. Federal funds, grants and support to states, counties and communities are based on population totals and breakdowns by sex, age, race and other factors. People in your community use Census Bureau data in all kinds of ways, such as these:

Residents use the census to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life and consumer advocacy.

 Businesses use the data to build factories, offices and stores, and these create jobs. Local government officials use the data to ensure public safety and plan new schools and hospitals.

Community planners and city planners use the data to plan new homes and improve neighborhoods.

Laws about Census The U.S. Constitution (Article I, Section 2) mandates a headcount every 10 years of everyone residing in the United States This includes people of all ages, races, and ethnic groups, to include citizens and noncitizens. The first census was conducted in 1790 and has been carried out every 10 years since then. The population totals from the 2020 census will determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives. States also use

the totals to redraw their legislative districts. The U.S. Census Bureau must submit state population totals to the President of the United States by December 31, 2020. The totals also help

determine federal and state money spent in your community, and data collected in the census help inform governmental, business, and nonprofit decision makers on how your community is changing in order to plan for the future. Confidentiality and Privacy The Census Bureau collects data for statistical purposes only. They combine your responses with information from

other households or businesses to produce statistics, which never identify your household, any person in your household, or business. Your information is CONFIDENTIAL. They never identify you individually. Title 13 of the U.S. Code protects the confidentiality of all your information and violating this law is a crime with severe penalties. In addition,

other federal laws, including the Confidential Statistical Efficiency Act and the Privacy Act reinforce these protections. The penalty for unlawful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment of up to 5 years, or both. What You Should Know

- Everyone counts. The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place. • It's in the Constitution. The U.S. Constitution requires a census every 10 years. The census covers the entire country and everyone living here. The
- first census was in 1790. • It's about redistricting. After each census, state officials use the results to redraw the boundaries of their congressional and state legislative districts, adapting to population shifts.
- It's about fair representation. Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets. Your data are confidential. Federal law protects your census responses. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics. By law we cannot share your information with immigration enforcement agencies, law enforcement agencies, or allow it to be used to determine your eligibility for government benefits.
- It means \$675 billion. Census data determine how more than \$675 billion are spent supporting your state, county and community's vital programs. More information is available at *census.nc.gov/census-101*.
