and Construction Scams

Sheriff Tommy Allen writes: We have recently seen an increase in the number of complaints regarding construction and repair scams. The problems have not been shoddy workmanship or overcharges, which have historically been issues. Now the problem is sim-

Typically, the homeowner has contracted either verbally or in a written contract for certain repairs or construction to be done. A partial payment is made up front to the contractor. But then the contractor delays, delays, delays with various excuses why he has not started the job. Finally, the contractor disappears. The home owner has nothing to show for his efforts; the money and the contractor are gone. Often times, the home owner has only a verbal agreement with nothing in writing and only the name of the so called contractor, which is often fictitious. Remember, anyone can get a business card or a contract printed up. These are difficult situations to solve. This may be either a civil or criminal matter, depending on a number of circumstances.

Individuals who need construction or repairs should make some efforts to make sure those they are dealing with are legitimate. They should seek advice from neighbors, friends or co-workers. Here are some recommendations that may reduce your chances of becoming a victim of construction and repair scams: 1. Use a local construction company or individual who has a long record of local work. Go see some of their work. Are they listed in the local telephone directory? 2. Get a written agreement that states clearly the exact costs, the work to be performed and completion dates. 3. Don't make a down payment before the work begins, unless you know the contractor and they have a good solid record of legitimate work. Make payments as work is completed. Never make a final payment until all work is completed.

4. If something doesn't seem just right after work has begun, write down the tag numbers of vehicles used by the contractor onsite. Contact your local building inspector or law enforcement agency.

5. Be wary of a contractor who contacts you looking for work, or who tries to rush you into agreeing to a job he claims needs to be done.

It is simply good business sense to be sure you are dealing with a legitimate company or individual. Honest companies or individuals will not mind you checking on them. Others will and will quickly disappear. It will save you a lot of grief and expense.

Prevent Summertime Tragedies: Never Leave Children Unattended in Cars

Insurance Commissioner Jim Long and Safe Kids North Carolina (SKNC) reminds parents and caregivers to never leave children unattended in vehicles, even for just a few minutes. Every year an average of 33 children in the United States die from heatstroke after being left unattended in a vehicle; since 2000, at least eight children in North Carolina have died from heat exposure after being left in a car unattended.

Temperatures inside a car can quickly reach up to 180 F degrees on a hot, sunny day, even up to 100 F degrees on a mild or cloudy day. Contrary to popular belief, cracking the windows does not significantly affect interior temperature. Unlike adults, children's bodies are not as capable of regulating body temperature in extreme heat. In fact, a young child's core body temperature increases three to five times faster than an adult's.

"It's never a good idea to leave children unattended in cars, especially the weather warms up here in North Carolina," said Commissioner Long. "Not only can kids suffer heatstroke, but they could also accidentally put the car in gear, release the emergency brake or worse. Take the few extra minutes to unbuckle your child and take her into the store, gas station or wherever you're going." Commissioner Long serves as the state chair of SKNC.

Follow these tips to protect your kids this summer:

Never leave a child alone in a vehicle.

 When parking your vehicle at home, always lock car doors and trunks, and keep keys out of children's reach. Teach children that cars are not places to play. · Watch children closely around cars, particularly when loading and unloading.

· Make sure that all children leave the vehicle with you when you reach your destination. Don't forget sleeping infants.

· Busy parents have a lot of their minds, so give yourself a reminder. Get in the habit of placing your purse, briefcase or other important items in the backseat next to your child's car seat. That way you'll remember to check the back before leaving the car.

• If you see a child or pet left unattended in a vehicle, call 911 immediately.
