Free Tobacco Cessation Sessions Offered at Health Department

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States. Worldwide, tobacco use causes nearly 6 million deaths per year, and current trends show that tobacco use will cause more than 8 million deaths annually by 2030. The Anson County Health Department is now offering free one-on-one tobacco cessation sessions for Anson County residents who are interested in quitting.

The nicotine in cigarettes is a very powerful and addictive drug. For most people, quitting isn't easy. Current statistics show that it can take a person 30 attempts before becoming successful in quitting, and 1 in 20 smokers attempting to quit are successful without some form of help.

Smokers may have a much better chance of quitting with a support program. Smoking cessation sessions are intended to help individuals quit smoking. Smoking cessation programs combine several methods and targets the fears and problems people have when quitting. They also provide ongoing support for staying away from tobacco.

It doesn't matter how long an individual has been a smoker, quitting is always beneficial. Not only does it lower the risk of getting various cancers, including lung cancer, it also reduce the chances of having heart disease, a stroke, emphysema, and other serious diseases. Quitting also will lower the risk of heart disease and lung cancer in nonsmokers who otherwise would be exposed to secondhand smoke.

The Anson County Health Department is offering free one-on-one tobacco cessation sessions provided by their Health Educator and Certified QuitSmart leader, Dinikia Savage. QuitSmart success rates are high and are proved to be more effective than other methods. QuitSmart also produced impressive quit rates in published research studies, such as the V.A. Medical Center in Durham North Carolina with a 51% quit rate over a 6 month period. With QuitSmart, tobacco users are assured of high quality professional help.

The QuitSmart tobacco cessation sessions will be scheduled on a monthly basis.

Hot Car Safety

In 2018, 52 children died from heatstroke in cars, either because they were left or became trapped. More than half of these cases were because an adult forgot about the child in the back seat.

To help avoid this catastrophe:

 Put your purse or phone next to the child's car seat so you'll always check the back before leaving the car.

• Keep a stuffed animal or memento in your child's car seat when it's empty. Move it to the front as a visual reminder when your child is in the back seat.

 Making a habit of checking your vehicle before getting out could save a life.

Wadesboro Is Downtown Strong(er)

On Thursday, June 6 Wadesboro hosted the last of three sessions with Diane Young, a consultant representing Downtown Strong, an offshoot of Governor Cooper's Hometown Strong initiative. The sessions, which were attended by members of the Anson County Chamber of Commerce, Anson County TDA, AnsonEDP and Uptown Wadesboro, focused on creating actionable plans for the revitalization of our uptown area. Notably, the meeting was held in the boardroom of the new REV Uptown development, a tangible example of just the sort of revitalization the initiative is trying to promote. In fact, Diane noted that Wadesboro is ahead of the curve in terms of redevelopment compared to some of the other communities she is working with. Still, there is much to be done.

Diane's recommendations to the group centered on two main points, better cooperation between the property owners, community leaders and businesses; and better promotion and a more proactive approach to bringing new businesses to uptown.

To address the former, Diane suggested we enlist the assistance of an outside property specialist to inventory our available properties, determine what needs to be done to make them viable as retail and office space, and, most importantly, meet with the owners to put together a realistic plan for the building. The Chamber attempted to do something similar to this a couple of years ago, but found the cost of hiring the specialist prohibitive. In this case, a grant from Downtown Strong will pay most, if not all, of the expense. Uptown Wadesboro has engaged the recommended specialist and is working to set a date for her to come to town for an initial meeting.

Concurrent with property development, Uptown Wadesboro will be working on a promotional package which will be used to recruit specific types of businesses to town. The specialist will help determine what types of businesses are most likely to succeed and what existing spaces are most appropriate for those businesses. There are a variety of different opinions about what businesses the uptown can support and it will be good to have a fresh set of eyes looking into that. Free Groceries Available to Eligible Families Saturday

Free USDA foods will be distributed this Saturday, June 15, from 1 to 4 p.m., or as long as supplies last, at Burnsville Recreation & Learning Center (BRLC). Please note that neighbors will only be served once monthly with these items as long as they last. If any food items are left over after Saturday they will be distributed on Wednesday, June 19 at 2 p.m.

All participants who plan to pick up food are asked to bring someone to help them if they need help, as BRLC will no longer be able to provide this support.

The US federal income guidelines will be a determining factor for individual's eligibility. The food items will only be available to Ansonians. Individuals who have not registered or received food before from the BRLC Emergency Food Pantry must have financial documentation as proof of income to be served. Those families who receive food stamp assistance will automatically qualify. Parents are asked not to bring children due to limited seating space. Neighbors are asked to please park in parking lot behind center.
